HOUSE BILL NO. 95, AN ACT CONCERNING TAKING SHELL-FISH FROM DESIGNATED GROUNDS.

"House Bill No. 95 concerning taking shell-fish from designated grounds refers to section 3248 of the General Statutes, which relates to buoing the beds. There has been some little misunderstanding on the part of some growers in regard to the meaning of that statute and the bill was drawn for the purpose of making it more clear and definite and since it was drawn the engineer has suggested a substitute bill which I will offer."

Mr. Perry here read the bill.

The buoing of the lots is a very important matter. The oyster police or any other official engaged in checking up the franchises, goes by these buoys as they appear on the surface of the water and they are supposed to be accurately located and no person is allowed to go upon any franchise which he may own unless there is at each corner, a buoy showing thereon the initials of the owner and the corner of the lot at which it is supposed to be located, together with such other intermediate buoys as are provided by law. This is the law as it is now. This proposed statute is intended to clarify the law and to have each of these corner buoys specify the corner that it is supposed to mark from the center of the lot; That is, northeast corner, northwest corner, etc., as the case may be. It also provides that the name or initials of the owner
