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LIQUOR
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Senate Bill 40 - AN ACT PROHIBITING UNAUTHORIZED SALE OF ALCOHOLIC LIQUOR. (SENATOR RISCASSI).

J. J. Fitzpatrick, Liquor Commission: May we consider Senate Bill 712 which is a similar matter, along with Senate Bill 40.

Senate Bill 712 - AN ACT AMENDING SECTION 469f OF THE LIQUOR CONTROL ACT. (SENATOR RISCASSI).

F. P. Rohrmayer, Liquor Commissioner: The real difference in the two bills is that in my bill we require a \$25 fee for each brand and the commission bill requires a fee of \$5. I believe a sum somewhere in between these two amounts would be favorable. There are a number of brands and when you realize the amount of help needed to carry out this program, I think it is only a modest sum.

J. J. Fitzpatrick, Liquor Commission: I am speaking for Senate Bill 712. Our fee of \$5 for each is sufficient. There is a lot of detail and correspondence and it has kept our office busy. It is an expense of course borne by the out-of-state shipper and does not affect the Connecticut permittees. It may follow that there may be some adjustment and probably we could arrange for a compromise figure.

Chairman Foley: How many brands are there?

J. J. Fitzpatrick, Liquor Commission: Several hundred thousand. However, there is no such number registered in Connecticut. There may be 5,000 to 10,000. This means considerable revenue to which the state is entitled.

Chairman Foley: Anyone else in favor? Anyone opposed? Closed.

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Favorable reports were received from the following committees and made the ORDER OF THE DAY: (SENATE BILLS) Tuesday June 5, 1945, at 12 o'clock noon. (Motion of Mr. Wanderer, Bethel.)

The committee on Finance to whom was referred Senate Bills Nos. 856; 857; 858; 859 and 860 - all committee bills, respectively:

- An Act Concerning the Soldiers, Sailors and Marines' Fund.
- An Act Concerning Cigarette Tax Stamps
- An Act Concerning Proceeds of Cigarette Tax
- An Act Concerning all Moneys so Paid to and Received by the American Legion.
- An Act Providing for an Increase in the Soldiers' Sailors' and Marines' Fund.

Senate bills read the second time, the reports of the committees named received, and tabled for the Calendar were: (Except *)

Bills received from the Senate and tabled for the Calendar and Printing were: JUDICIARY: House Bill No. 1263 (Committee Bill) - An Act Concerning the State Housing Authority.

Bill referred to the Legislative Council:

House Bill No. 12 - Under a suspension of the rules, the report of the FINANCE committee was accepted and the bill so referred, under a suspension of the rules.

A report of the committee on BANKS on a bill entitled "An Act Concerning Savings Bank Life Insurance" was received from the Senate, the substitute bill having been amended by Senate amendment, Schedule "A" and passed and the report of the committee accepted. (The House had formerly amended the bill by House Amendment Schedule "A" and passed the substitute bill.) On motion of Mr. Ahrens of Suffield, the House voted to adhere to its former action.

Mr. Parr: Mr. Speaker, the committee on Licensed Occupations are not going to take action on the rules that they have had turned in because of the resolution requesting the Legislative Council to study the whole question of licensed occupations.

Senate Bill No. 272 - An Act Amending the Charter of the City of New Haven, concerning the Construction of Sewers in the Thirty-second Ward. Favorable report of the committee on Cities and Boroughs. This bill passed without debate in concurrence with the Senate. See Schedule "A" attached, explained by Mr. Pratt of Willington.

Substitute for Senate Bill No. 791 - An Act Amending the Charter of the City of New Haven

"Favorable report of the Committee on Cities and Boroughs. Explained by Mr. Pratt, passed without debate - in concurrence.

House Joint Resolution No. 351 - Resolution Urging Adoption of the Free Press Principle on a World-wide Basis. Favorable report of the Committee on Federal and Intergovernmental Relations. Explained by Mr. Parr of Chester, and adopted without debate.

Senate Bill No. 712 - An Act Concerning the Sale of Alcoholic Liquor. This bill was explained by Mr. Membrino, Waterbury, which received a favorable report by the committee on Liquor Control. The bill passed without debate in concurrence with the Senate, as amended by Sch. "A".
