THE PRESIDENT: Motion is on recess until 12:30. If there is no objection, the Senate will stand in recess.

The Senate re-convened at 12:35 p.m., the President in the Chair.

House Joint Resolutions 19, 20 and 21 were read into the record by the Clerk (see page 224 of the Senate Journal attached hereto).
House Bills Nos. 558 through 595 were read into the record by the Clerk and referred to their proper committees by the President - see pages 224 - 227 of the Journal attached hereto.

Senator Watson of the Fourth District presiding.

House Bills 596 through 754 were read into the record by the Clerk and referred to their proper committees by the Chair.

Senate Bills Nos. 443 - 529 were read into the record by the Clerk and referred to their proper committees by the Chair. See pages 199 - 209 of the Journal attached hereto)

SENATOR RYAN OF THE THIRTY FIRST DISTRICT: I move we recess until 1:15 p.m. (there being no objection, the senate recessed until 1:50 p.m.

Senator Patrick Ward of the First District in the Chair.

SENATOR LONGO: OF THE NINETEENTH DISTRICT: I suggest if there is any business to come before the body that it be taken up first and the bills be read afterwards.

THE CHAIR: Any business before the Senate outside of Bills. (none)

SENATOR REINHARD OF THE TWENTY THIRD DISTRICT: The Clerk has a Resolution.

THE CLERK: SB 1289, An Act Incorporating the Barrett Water Company.

THE PRESIDENT: Referred to Committee on Public Utilities.

FAVORABLE REPORTS: SB 700, SB 307, SB 306, SB 300 and HB 799 tabled for the Calendar and printing.

THE PRESIDENT: The Clerk has an announcement.

THE CLERK: In Sec. 37 of the Senate Rules, paragraph 2; Any substitute or committee bill reported favorably after May 15th shall be filed with the Clerk, together with two copies thereof. Said Clerk shall deliver one copy to the Clerk of the House and retain the other copy in his possession. All notices of the progress of the original bills shall be made on the copies. If the substitute bill cannot be located, either copy or file copy shall be used in place of the original bill.

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SENATOR LONGO: Mr. President, this bill would assure those persons filing a general appearance, in probate matters, of all notices of all proceedings involving the estate. It is a good bill and should pass.

SENATOR LONGO OF THE NINETEENTH DISTRICT: May Cal 968 be passed, retaining its place?

THE CLERK: Cal. 969, File 542, HB 654, An Act concerning Conservator of Incapable Person.

(Upon motion of the Senator Longo of the 19th District for acceptance of the committee's favorable report and passage of the bill, a Voice vote was taken and the Chair declared the report accepted and the bill passed.)

SENATOR LONGO: Mr. President, this bill would allow the State Welfare Commissioner to make application for the appointment of a Conservator on behalf of a person receiving care or assistance from the State without referring the matter to the Selectman of the Town.

THE CLERK: Cal. 970, File 516, HB 657, An Act concerning Support of Widows During Probate.

(Upon motion of Senator Longo of the 19th District for acceptance of the committee's favorable report and passage of the bill, a voice vote was taken and the Chair declared the report accepted and the bill passed.)

SENATOR LONGO: Mr. President, passage of this bill would mean that Real Estate, as part of the deceased estate for which

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allowances of support may be paid, such allowance for the support of the deceased wife or family must come from personal property and not real estate. This would make both real and personal property subject to payment.

THE CLERK: Cal. 971, File 517, HB 667, An Act concerning Distribution of Damages for Death.

(Upon motion of Senator Longo of the 19th District for acceptance of the committee's favorable report and passage of the bill, a voice vote was taken and the Chair declared the report accepted and the bill passed.)

SENATOR LONGO: Mr. President, the passage of this bill provides for allowances for the support of a family during administration, to be payable from death damages.

THE CLERK: Cal. 972, File 518, HB 670, An Act concerning Allowance for Support of Surviving Spouse and Family.

(Upon motion of Senator Longo of the 19th District for acceptance of the committee's favorable report and passage of the bill, a voice vote was taken and the Chair declared the report accepted and the bill passed.)

SENATOR LONGO: Mr. President, this bill, specifically, names real and personal estates of a deceased to be used for allowances of the family during the settlement of an estate.

THE CLERK: Cal. 973, File 572, HB (sub.) 994, An Act authorizing Municipalities to Regulate the Removal of Soil, Loam, Sand and Gravel.

SENATOR RYAN OF THE THIRTY FIRST DISTRICT: In the absence of

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such person shall receive such notice on all matters relating to such estate, trust, or other matter of which notice is desired. I move acceptance of the Committee's favorable report and passage of the bill.

Mr. Speaker, this bill is a companion bill to Calendar No. 717 that was just passed. It provides that during the settlement of the estate, the widow can receive support from the "real or personal" estate of her husband. I move acceptance of the Committee's favorable report and passage of the bill.

Judge Patrick Healey - Above bills are really one proposal.
Above propose amending Sections 7871, 7872, 7875, 7876 and 7877 of
1949 General Statutes to make certain that depositions may be taken in
probate proceedings.

The same necessities exist as in "civil actions" generally.

H.B. 643 (Pruyn) AN ACT CONCERNING SPECIAL NOTICE TO BE GIVEN ON WRITTEN
REQUEST.

Judge Patrick Healey - In favor of bill. The purpose is to make certain
that a request to a probate court for notice of proceedings shall be in
effect a general appearance entitling person or attorney filing same to
notice of all subsequent proceedings, without renewal and without specifica-
tion of particular steps.

H.B. 657 (Pruyn) AN ACT CONCERNING SUCCESSION UPON THE DEATH OF EITHER SPOUSE.

H.B. 667 (Pruyn) AN ACT CONCERNING DAMAGES FOR CAUSING DEATH, HOW DISTRIBUTED.

H.B. 670 (Pruyn) AN ACT CONCERNING ALLOWANCE FOR SUPPORT OF SURVIVING SPOUSE
AND FAMILY.

Judge Patrick Healey - The purpose of above three bills is to make certain
that allowances for support of the family during administration may be payable
from any and all assets, particularly including real estate.

H.B. 677 (Pruyn) AN ACT CONCERNING PROCEEDINGS ON APPLICATION FOR APPOINTMENT
OF CONSERVATOR.

Judge Patrick Healey - The Connecticut Probate Assembly drafted this bill
and desires to withdraw it because we now feel that the present laws to
