George Yarwood, Simsbury, chairman of the registration committee of our professional group: We wish to register unanimous approval of this bill. We have a small membership in the state but because of our location, many outside workers work with us in Connecticut. We anticipate about 400 people registering.

Chester Hogan, vice president and manager, C. R. Byrne Nurseries: We have two small changes to suggest in this bill and we have discussed them with the proponents and they are in agreement. In Section c of Section 7 after the word "horticulturist", it is our recommendation to term it "horticultural consultant". Section c exemptions apply to and are related to Section 3 and in order to make it clear we would after the words "no person" insert the phrase "not exempt from the provisions of this chapter".

S. B. No. 600 - Bauer - AN ACT CONCERNING LICENSING OF AMUSEMENTS:

Rep. Lawrence, East Windsor: I wish to go on record as being in favor of this bill.

Sen. Bauer, 5th District: This is a bill which is aimed at blocking a loophole in the law regarding circuses or carnivals. In Section 3718 the state police can regulate circuses and carnivals under a tent. On an occasion carnivals come into the state and do not meet the requirements, and if they are ordered to cease operations, they would be able to hold the show if they took the tent down.

Rep. Pruyn: Anyone opposed? The hearing is closed. We will take up S. B. No. 836. Anyone in favor?

S. B. No. 836 - Fischman - AN ACT CONCERNING QUALIFICATIONS FOR CHIROPODY LICENSE WITHOUT EXAMINATION

Rep. Simko, Bridgeport: This is a reciprocity bill. There are several states throughout the country that have this but Connecticut does not have it. It is important that the men of this profession, as in other professions, retain the rights and reputations they have in the community. As it stands, if a chiropodist wants to move to another state, they would require an examination. We do not have that and we allow them to come into the state. I hope you will favor this bill.

Joseph Camilleri, Connecticut Master Barbers Association: It is a difficult thing to come here and oppose the State of Connecticut but somebody has to look after the poor people. If you pass this law you will be clipping the barbers instead of the barbers clipping you. There has not been a good reason to say why they need \$24,00 biannually. It is a self-sustaining board. We have tried to compromise on this bill but we have vailed. There is enough money. There are at present 5542 barbers which would increase the figure to well over \$10,000.

Rep. Cady: I notice the bill has several changes in fees. Which one are you objecting to?

Mr. Camileri: Objecting to acorss the board increase - \$6.00 barber license, \$6.00 barber shop license.

Mr. Schiavone: There is a need for it. That \$15.00 for a manager's license, that was more or less a slip-up two years ago in the legislation whereby they were supposed to have an examination with a fee attached to it and that bill got lost.

Rep. Pruyn: Captain Shaw, did you want to speak on a bill?

Capt. Carol Shaw, State Police, Hartford: Yes, S. B. 600 - AN ACT CONCERNING LICENSING OF AMUSEMENTS: DEFINITIONS. I am here today representing J. C. Kelly, Commissioner. I am authorized by him to register approval of the amendment as presented by Senator Bauer. An act such as this would be for the best interest of the public.

Rep. Cady: The word "carnival". Do you think there would be any problem in bringing that in church bazaars or American Legion affairs?

Capt. Shaw: I consulted reference books for a legal definition of "carnival" but was unable to find it. I do not think it will constitute too much of a problem but I think we can take care of the carnivals.

Rep. Yesukiewicz: Would this bring in fire hazards? You would be stepping on the toes of volunteer firemen.

Capt. Shaw: At the present time we do regulate carnivals providing there is a tent capable of handling 100 or more persons. I think that is the only thing that brings us into the picture.
