But more importantly, I think in Section 53 a great many members of our circle, might heave a sigh of relief, they have really gotten away with something because, this repeals a portion of the section 53 178 which permitted a peace officer to arrest vagabonds without a warrant. I think that a great sigh of relief of many members of this circle, should be heaved at this point. I move for its passage.

This bill does primarily three things. First it adds dependent child to the definition of a juvenile who may be brought within the jurisdiction of the juvenile court. Dependent child is defined in the act we passed about a half hour ago, H.B. 891. Secondly, it gives the juvenile court judge the right to put the juvenile in care of either a public or a private agency. Thirdly it clarifies somewhat the fact which has always been true, that the juvenile court judge may be the guardian of the child committed. I move its passage.

Just to give a very short example, at the time that certain powers of the Chief Justice were transferred to the Chief Court Administrator a number of the various statutes in which reference was made for the exercise of these powers were not made to conform. To go through each individual item in its turn I'm afraid we'd be here for the next two hours. It has been prepared by both Mr. Lewis and Mr. Hausman and I urge its acceptance.
