CAL. NO. 1078. File No. 1210. Favorable report of the Joint Committee on Judiciary and Governmental Functions. Modified Senate Bill No. 1521. An Act concerning the Basis of Personal Jurisdiction as a Result of the Act of (Non-Domiciliaries) Nonresident Individuals and Foreign Partnerships.

SENATOR PICKETT:

This is an extension of the long-arm statute, Mr. President, this in effect increases the ability of people, in the State of Connecticut, to bring into this jurisdiction, those persons who are outside the State of Connecticut, but, who have established themselves as residents for two purposes, by performing any of the acts as set forth in section 1 of the bill.

Again, this is an extension of what is called the long-arm statute. To bring personal jurisdiction into Connecticut for people who have been in Connecticut doing business and making them subject to the laws of the Courts of the State of Connecticut.

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THE CHAIR:

Question is on passage of the bill. Those in favor indicate by saying, "aye". Opposed. Bill is passed.

THE CLERK:

CAL. NO. 1075. File No. 1207. Favorable report of the Joint Committee on Judiciary and Governmental Functions. Senate Bill No. 42. An Act concerning the Penalty for Commission of Crimes While Armed.

SENATOR PICKETT:
