This act amends Sec. 12-132 by eliminating the body writ from the local property tax Warrant. It also repeals Sec. 12-160 which was the poor debtors oath, which is now unnecessary. Four years ago we eliminated body writs from all other actions and inadvertently the local property tax warrant was excluded. I would ask passage of the bill.
