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SENATOR PAC:

Mr. President, I move the acceptance of the joint committee's favorable report and passage of the bill. High Rock State Park is supposed to be a small state park, located in Beacon Falls and New York. This bill would rename it, in honor of Claire O'Shea, who I understand, was one of the first of her sex to represent them in this Legislature. Everyone speaks highly of her. SENATOR PAC:

Mr. President, I move acceptance of the joint committee's favorable report and passage of this bill. This bill changes some definitions. Any operator of any boat or marine districts had to be a citizen of the United States. Now, this would require only that he be a it changes it to person. The reason is that a great many of the people that are applying are water are not citizens of this country and also, the deck hands would have to also

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vessels. So, it's a necessary bill. and Thirdly, it deletes the last five lines of it which define a citizen. One who can hold one of these permits as being someone who resided continuously prior to 1923, ten years previously in that case, you would have to be something like 87 or 90 years old before you could get a permit. It's redundant and I think has to be taken off the books.
