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Calendar 492, Substitute for Senate Bill 1013, - An Act to Provide a Minimum Age for Patent and Propriety Medicine Sale Permits and a Penalty for Failure to Report a Change of Permittee, as amended by Senate Amendment Schedule "A".

MR. SPEAKER:

Gentleman from the 114th.

REPRESENTATIVE PRETE:

The Clerk has an amendment.

MR. SPEAKER:

The Clerk call Senate Amendment Schedule "A".

CLERK:

Senate Amendment Schedule "A".

In line 37, after the word "AGE" and before the comma insert the words "OR OLDER".

MR. SPEAKER:

Questions on adoption of Senate Amendment Schedule "A".

The gentleman from the 114th.

REPRESENTATIVE PRETE:

The amendment is a very technical amendment prior to the change, only persons 21 years old would be able to operate drug stores and I don't think we want this, so I urge the adoption of the amendment.

MR. SPEAKER:

Further remarks on the amendment. If not, all those in favor of adopting Senate Amendment Schedule "A", indicate by saying "Aye". Those opposed. The amendment is adopted, it is

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ruled technical. Gentleman from the 114th.

REPRESENTATIVE PRETE:

I move acceptance of the Joint Committee's favorable report and passage of the bill in concurrence with the Senate as amended by Senate Amendment "A".

MR. SPEAKER:

Will you remark further.

REPRESENTATIVE PRETE:

Mr. Speaker, the bill provides a minimum age for patent and proprietary medicine-sale of patent and proprietary medicines, and the permits that need to be issued therefore, and also provides a penalty for failure to report changes in the permittee as indicated. I urge passage of the bill.

Will you remark further on the bill as amended by Senate Amendment Schedule "A". If not, all those in favor indicate by saying "Aye". Those opposed. The bill as amended is passed.

SENATOR PAC:

Mr. President, I move acceptance of the joint committee's favorable report and passage of the bill. I think the Clerk has an amendment.

THE CLERK:

SENATE AMENDMENT SCHEDULE A, offered by Senator Pac:

In line 37, after the word "age", and before the comma insert the words "or older."

SENATOR PAC:

Mr. President, the amendment would really correct a grievous error. It would confine the issuance of a permit to 21 years old and of course, this is rather assinine to put it mildly. This would make it 21 years of

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THE CHAIR:

Question is on adoption of the amendment. Will you remark further? If not, all those in favor of adopting the amendment signify by saying, "aye." Opposed, "nay." The amendment is adopted. Ruled technical.

SENATOR PAC:

Mr. President, I move the acceptance of the committee's favorable report and passage of the bill, as amended.

This bill simply requires that, any hold of a permit to sell proprietary and patent drugs be at least 21 years of age. It further requires that any notification of change in a permittee, be made within five days otherwise there's a penalty of 50% of the initial fee.

THE CHAIR:

Will you remark further? If not, all those in favor of passage of the bill signify by saying, "aye." Opposed, "nay". The ayes have it. The bill is passed.

CAL. NO. 203. File No. 234. Favorable report of the Joint Committee on Corrections, Welfare and Humane Institutions. Substitute Senate Bill 599.  
An Act Concerning Procedure on Arrest on a Bench Warrant.

SENATOR CIALONE:

Mr. President, I move the acceptance of the committee's favorable report and passage of the bill.

Presently Section 54-43, places a rather conflicting role on the Department of Corrections Personnel. Passage of this bill would leave the role in the hands of a different person making the arrest on the basis of the bench warrant. ~~The problem that is created is particularly difficult in~~
