Mr. Speaker, I move acceptance of the Joint Committee's favorable report and passage of the bill in concurrence with the Senate.

Yes, Mr. Speaker. This allows the Commissioner of Welfare to contract services from private nonprofit organizations for the care of children committed to his charge. The cost includes the contracting for the operation and maintenance of receiving homes for the protection and care of children under the charge or the guardianship of the Commissioner of Welfare. 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Concerning Reimbursement to the Welfare Commissioner of the Cost of Care  
Furnished by Him to Children Other Than Those Committed to Him.

SENATOR CIARLONE:

Mr. President, I move adoption of the joint committee's favorable report and passage of the bill. This is an administrative bill. Heretofore, an uncommitted child, when committed to an institution, the services from this institution were shared by the parent and by the Welfare Department. It was always a problem collecting this money. This bill would allow the Welfare Department, to pay the bill in full and they then in turn seek collection from the parent. I urge the adoption.

SENATOR CIARLONE:

Mr. President, I move adoption of the joint committee's favorable report and passage of the bill. This bill allows the Welfare Commissioner to establish or lease receiving homes for children in his care. He may contract for the operation and maintenance of such receiving homes, which would then be a non-profit group and the maximum he can pay these particular receiving homes is the going rate that is now allowed for patients in Humane Institutions. It's a new concept and we feel that it will perhaps help these children that are sent to these receiving homes. I urge adoption.
