CAL. NO. 455. File No. 614. Favorable report of the joint committee on Corrections, Welfare and Humane Institutions, Senate Bill 1438. An Act Concerning Support of Girls Committed to the House of the Good Shepherd.

SENATOR CIARLONE:

Mr. President, I move acceptance of the joint committee's favorable report and passage of the bill. This bill enables the House of Good Shepherd to deal directly with the Welfare Department in establishing rates for people committed to them. Since the Welfare Department commits people to the House of Good Shepherd we feel that they should establish the rate.

SENATOR CALDWELL:

Mr. President, I move acceptance of the committ'e favorable report and passage of the bill. The bill creates a State Commission to Study and investigate the problems of the deaf and hearing impaired persons. It s a de-serving bill. I urge passage.

CAL. NO. 463. File No. 692. Favorable report of the joint committee on Public Health and Safety. Substitute House Bill 5106. An Act to Enforce the Elimination of Leadbased Paint in Housing Accommodations.

SENATOR PAC:

Mr. President, I move the acceptance of the joint committee's favorable report and passage of the bill. This is a rather important bill and it would add teeth in our drive to eliminate the hazards of lead paint. It adds the violation of hazardous paint that the Board of Health can order to correct in addition to the other violations. It defines hazardous paint as cracked, chipped, blistered, flaking or loose paint. The tenants representative connected with the Circuit Court has added to his responsibility this new complaint that can be acted upon and this is the area of hazardous paint. It relieves the tenant from paying any rent, if the department is in violation of this paint section. In addition, this power they currently have for other violations. It prohibits any person or firm from using any paint on interior or other accessible surfaces. Paint that doesn't come to A&S I standards. And it prohibits the distribution of paint that doesn't meet ANSI standards. These are American National Standard Institute, standards set up by the Committee of Manufacturers themselves. I urge passage.

THE CHAIR:

The motion is to confirm action taken by this body at 9:21 this A.M. Would you remark further on this motion?

SENATOR CALDWELL:

Yes, you are. I am in concurrence with the Minority Leader.

THE CHAIR:

SENATOR JACKSON:

THE CHAIR:

Senator Jackson, was this bill recalled?

SENATOR JACKSON:

THE CHAIR:

As I looked at Rule 23, yestereday, it's not necessary to repass it. Unless both Houses, in concurrence, either alter it or revoke it, it still is in effect. Whenever a bill is passed in both Houses, which this has, if either House desires it be returned for further consideration, we set up the committee and we brought it back. The bill shall be returned first to that

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House, which the motion of its return originated. And the bill may then be altered or rejected, by a concurrent vote of the two Houses. But, if not altered or rejected, by such confirmed vote, it shall again be transmitted to the Governor or Legislative Commissioner's Office. Am I in error?

SENATOR JACKSON:

How do we now get it to the House, Mr. President?

THE CHAIR:

I think the rules is, I'm not trying to throw any roadblocks in your way.

SENATOR JACKSON:

Then, the correct motion would be a motion for immediate transmittal.

THE CHAIR:

No, I don't think that's necessary either. It was recalled.

SENATOR JACKSON:

It was recalled, Mr. President, because of a question that was raised in the Governor's Office.

THE CHAIR:

Now that you have it back, you wish to have it passed in the same form?

SENATOR JACKSON:

That is correct. We wish to make no alterations or changes.

THE CHAIR:

The motion is that the Senate neither alter nor reject the bill and concluded in the motion, is that the sense of our motion be transmitted with the bill, to the House with a concurrent resolution.

SENATOR JACKSON:

Immediately.

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THE CHAIR:

Is there any objection? All those in favor signify by saying, "aye".
Opposed, "nay". The ayes have it.
