THE CLERK:

Calendar No. 846, Substitute for Senate Bill No. 1547, An Act to Require the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles to Publish Regulations Relative to a Point System for Motor Vehicle Violations. File No. 682.

MR. SPEAKER:

Would the House come to order. It's a bit noisy. I'm having difficulty hearing. I'm sure the same is the case to the members and the Clerk.

THOMAS H. DOOLEY, 47th District:

Mr. Speaker, I move for adoption of the joint committee's favorable report and adoption of the bill in accordance with the Senate.

MR. SPEAKER:

Question is on acceptance and passage in concurrence with the Senate, will you remark?

THOMAS H. DOOLEY, 47th District:

Mr. Speaker, this bill would require the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles to spell out clearly the number of points to be assessed against an operator of a motor vehicle. It requires him to publish these points by regulation and a period which would cause an operator to be subject to a departmental hearing or cause the automatic suspension of his license. It would also cause him to state by regulation the length of time that any such suspension would last. Mr. Speaker, presently

Mr. President, I move acceptance of the joint committee's favorable report and passage of the bill. This bill enacted into law would require the Liquor Control Commission to hold a hearing in every instance where a group of people oppose the granting of a permit.

CAL. NO. 530. File No. 682. Favorable report of the joint committee on Judiciary. Substitute Senate Bill 1547. An Act To Require the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles to Publish Regulations Relative to a Point System for Motor Vehicle Violations.

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SENATOR ROME:

Mr. President, I move acceptance of the committee's joint favorable report and passage of the bill. This bill provides that the Commissioner will publish the point schedule, under which we hold hearings and determine the ability of one to utilize the privilege of an operator's license in Connecticut. I feel it's only fair that, this kind of a schedule be in writing, published and available to the public.

THE CLERK:

CAL. NO. 538. File No. 516. Favorable report of the joint committee on Banks and Regulated Activities. House Bill 6168. An Act Concerning Retirement of Officers and Employees by Savings and Loan Associations.

SENATOR BUCKLEY:

Mr. President, I move acceptance of the joint committee's favorable report and passage of the bill. The bill reduces from 30 to 25 years, the number of years officers in savings and loans have to serve before retirement. Also reduces the age from 65 to 60; takes out a grandfather's clause that was in the previous act and reduces the number of years in which the annual pension is computed from the last five to the last three.
