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to be scattered through the 169 towns. 7107, proports to be a clarification of the kind of property that is tax exempt. I have read it over time and again, and so far have been not able to discover what it clarifies, in the absense pf sufficient clarity as to what it is supposed to clarify, we would be opposed to it. 7111, is another bill on the problem of creating special taxing districts. We would oppose it for the reasons above. 7112, deals with reporting requirements it is not quite clear to me, what additional information the towns require other than that it provided for in the so called.....reports, that the town gets from the tax exempt institutions. This bill for instance adds such matters as the institutions should lift its investment portfolio and I am at some loss to see why this would have anything to do with the tax exemption of real property. 7113, is a very queer bill, it says thatit will bill the state for the same amount. , 7121, deals with partial taxation of exempt property in porportion to percentage to non-residents served by the tax exempt institution. I spoke at an earlier meeting of your committee on a bill that would apparently require Hartford Hospital to charge more to residents of West Hartford, than to residents of Hartford, on the theory that the Hospital is in Hartford, and the citizens should get a break based upon the amount of tax exemption which the hospital has. This bill is apparently on the same lines, but, it raises serious problems like who would be a patron of the Wadsworth.....how would ayou assess the patrons of an institution of that kind. One rate for Hartford people, and one rate for people outside the community. It seems to me that to try to impose different taxation based upon in-town and out-of-town facilities of an institution or persons treated by the institution or students at a institution, is not realistic that the institution for what value it has has, a value broader than the mere town in which it is located, certainly Hartford Hospital would serve the whole Hartford community, certainly research is a major medical institution would benefit far more than the community in which it exists. 6357, apparently, is designed to help hospitals and we would be in favor of that bill. It provides as I understand it, for exemption for property leased to a hospital. This I assume would include such things as IBM machinery in the hospital, on which taxes are levied. Which is of course passed on to the hospital which in turn has to reimburse IBM or whoever the owner of the leased material would be. Briefly on, 5355, this is not a bill directly pertaining to any of the institutions that I represent, in that it affects only certain named institutions, but the, fallout from the bill at this time and the theory of such a bill would be objectionable to the institutions that I represent. Representative Rose, for instance, said that one of the reasons for this bill was to tax faculty housing, faculty housing in so far as I know, are taxed in every town in Connecticut. It may not be if it is on the campus, the faculty member is living on campus, has students in his house, this presents a specific situation. But, the normal faculty house scattered throughout the community has been held by our Supreme Court, and New Canaan Day School case to be taxable in so far as I know in certainly in the vast majority of cases it would be on
