part of the bargain. And by 1965 the State of Connecticut took them into Court to have them furnish their 2/3 share of the \$102,000 cost. Now at this point I think its to the advantage of the state to waive the \$65,000. Because the Town of Saybrook has in writing from Water Resources that in order to fulfill their share of the bargain they would be willing to come back every three or four years and pump an additional 67 thousand cubic yards of sand. Now the cost here would be something like \$100,000 every three or four years. Its almost ridiculous. So if they would release Saybrook from this part of their bargain, Saybrook has assured them that the Chalker Beach Association will go ahead and build a jetty on their own. The Chalker Beach Association has applied and has received support and approval from the Water Resources. They have not received the permit from Saybrook. Saybrook will not give it to them until the state of Connecticut releases them from their share because they'll have recourse then to Chalker Beach. And at that point they might be insolvent with all this going around.

So to sum it up, it an advantage of the state. If we release Saybrook, we are going to save a few hundred thousand dollars. And this is about the extent of the matter.

report favorably HB 5960 (Rep. Klebanoff) AN ACT CONCERNING THE BOARDS OF TRUSTEES FOR THE STATE TECHNICAL COLLEGES AND THE AWARDING OF DEGREES. HB5960 amends section 10-108a of the 1969 supplement of the general statutes by authorizing the State Technical Colleges to confer the associate of science degree instead of the present associate in applied science degree. Of 648 two year post secondary institutions awarding associate degrees, only 16 confer the associate in applied science degree. The associate of arts or the associate of science degree is offered by a large majority of institutions. The associate of applied science degree is restrictive and usually connotes specialization in a narrow segment of engineering technology and is not representative of the broad base in science programs in which the State Technical Colleges require. Thank you Mr. Chairman. I'll leave a copy of these remarks.

Rep. Klebanoff: Thank you Mr. Ross. I believe there's a question.

Rep. Truex: Dr. Ross, I'm Representative Truex from the 23rd District. Just very briefly on the figures you quoted for the Hartford State Technical College, and its incorporation into a broader base academic institution, is that 11,000,000 dollars, is that to be devoted toward the purchase of land, or is that just for the buildings, or as a share of the Hartford State Technical College in this whole complex. Could you expand on that just a little bit. It doesn't seem like much money to move a college.

Dr. Ross: At this moment, I don't know the answer. We'll have to get it for you.

Rep. Truex: Thank you very much.

Dr. Ross: Unless we do have here Mr. Lombardi, who is the executive director of the Technical Colleges; Lou, what's the answer to that question. Cost of the building and the land.

Rep. Truex: Part of the land that the Technical College would use? Thank you.

Rep. Klebanoff: Thank you Dr. Ross. These microphones that you see us passing around, are not for amplification. They are purely to enable the voices to be recorded on the transcript. I'm sorry if you may have a
