Rep. Bigos: wish to speak about two bills for the record. The bills are HB5685, HB5695; HB5685 (Rep. Bigos-Rep. Hanzalek-Rep. Trudan-Rep. King-Rep. Locke-Rep. Nigro-Rep. Leary) AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR THE OPERATION OF A COMMUNITY COLLEGE IN THE NORTHERN CONNECTICUT AREA: HB5695 (Rep. Bigos-Rep. Hanzalek, Rep. Trudan-Rep. King-Rep. Locke-Rep. Nigro-Rep. Leary) AN ACT CONCERNING THE AUTHORIZATION OF BONDS FOR LEASED FACILITIES FOR A REGIONAL COMMUNITY COLLEGE IN THE NORTHERN CONNECTICUT AREA. I agree with the House Chairman these bill are going to be referred to the Appropriations Committee. They did appear in today's hearing. My only purpose is that these are not treated by default in the Education Committee.

Rep. Klebanoff: Thank you Representative Bigos. Representative King.

Rep. King: Representative King from the 37th District, to speak briefly on behalf of SB410 and SB625. SB410 ( Sen. Pac) AN ACT CONCERNING STATE EMPLOYEE PARKING both of which relate to parking at the Connecticut State Central College. And I'd like to leave with your secretary a statement signed by some of the students, by one of the faculty members of that college which tells very briefly some of the problems they encountered over this parking situation. I personally became familiar with this this summer and seriously hope that something is done.

Statement presented by Representative King:

As you may remember there was very nearly a riot this past fall at Central Connecticut State College following installation of parking gates at the entrance of all surface parking lots used by students, staff and faculty of the institution. After more than a week of boycott and demonstrations the gates were removed through the intervention of Senator Eddy and others. It was agreed by all parties to the conflict that the precedent setting action should be suspended until the legislature could judge the situation.

This problem must be resolved. At this time state employees are generally permitted to park on state land free of charge. At U-Conn I understand there is a bus fee from off campus parking to the center of the campus. On the Central Connecticut State College campus a garage is under construction. It is not clear who should pay for this garage. The college administration intended to meet the garage obligations by requiring faculty, staff and students to pay for all parking on campus (the garage is not finished).

I urge you to pass Senate Bills 410 and 625 for these reasons:

1. Payment of fees for parking amounts to a reduction in salary for the employees of CCSC. It also amounts to an increase in fees for students who park on campus. Such students frequently drive to the college because they are unable to afford residence costs at any college.
2. Payment of parking fees is discriminatory. Other state employees parking on state land are not required to pay such costs.
3. Precedent would be set if such fees were instituted for state employees at CCSC. Administrators at other state institutions are watching the situation with interest.
4. Payment of such fees amount to double taxation for state employees, We pay once as citizens of Connecticut and a second time as employees of the state.

Your thoughtful consideration of these matters will be sincerely appreciated. Thank you. By David C. Newton, Chapter President American Association of University Professors and a member of CSEA.

Rep. Klebanoff: Representative DeNardis.

Sen. DeNardis: Mr. Chairman, members of the Committee, I would like to address a few remarks to the matter of state aid to the independent colleges in Connecticut. There were to have been at least two bills ready this morning on this subject. That is two bill that would provide tuition grants to Connecticut students who would attend Connecticut's independent colleges and universities. One of them supported by the Connecticut Conference of Independent Colleges which was to have been introduced by the chairman of this committee I understand as well as myself, and a few other people. Would provide a \$1000 grant for Connecticut students who are attending private colleges in the State on a full time basis. That bill is not ready, but just prior to the beginning of this hearing, I picked up the bill which I have introduced which utilizes the same principle but provides a smaller grant, \$750. The total \$750 would be paid to the college, \$300 of which would be charged against the tuition and \$150 would be used as administrative overhead costs. The approach taken in these bills, the one that is now ready, SB1292 (Sen. DeNardis) AN ACT CONCERNING EDUCATION OF CONNECTICUT RESIDENTS IN INDEPENDENT COLLEGES and one seems to be ready provides the higher grant refines and strengthens Public Act 627 which was passed by the General Assembly in 1969, which did
