SENATOR CIARLONE:

I move acceptance of the joint committee s favorable report and passage of the bill, as amended, Mr. President. This permits the State Welfare Department to purchase services or to provide grants to public or private agencies for the more difficult problems pertaining to various families. The intent here being that the private or public agency might have better personnel to cope with these services, in view of the fact that social workers are over burdened with additional work. We feel that this would perhaps, free our social workers and provide more services for the beneficiaries.

Rep. Chagnon: My name is John Chagnon, I'm Representative from the 97th and Vice Chairman of this Committee. And we'll declare the Hearing open. We usually reserve first for our Representatives and Senators to speak and I see we have some in the audience here. Would you like to identify yourself for the record and speak clearly into that for our Secretary.

Rep. Bonetti: Thank you, sir. Representative Bonetti, 175th District in Torrington. I am here to testify in behalf of the Democratic leadership of the House of Representatives, in support of House Bill 8967, An Act establishing an Indian Affairs Commission. I don't think this is in your program as of yet and you might not even have a copy of it, I don't know. For too long, Connecticut's Indians have been under the jurisdiction of the Welfare Commissioner. Indians must be able to determine their own affairs as well as those activities which take place on Indian Reservations within the laws of the State of Connecticut. This Bill establishes a Commission on Indian Affairs composed of seven members. Four of whom represent each of the four Indian Tribes in Connecticut. It allows Indians to determine the affairs of Indians. Who better knows the problems of the Indians. Now I will leave this copy with you later on. I'd like to make another one. I have a few notes on this. Thank you.

Sen. Power: Mr. Chairman and Members of the Committee, my name is Senator P. Edmund Power. I represent the 30th Senatorial District and I would like to also speak in favor of Bill No. 8967. It is my understanding that in all the years that the Indian affairs have been under the jurisdiction of the Welfare Department, the Indians in Connecticut have not received fair treatment. Their problems have not been taken care of properly and it would seem as though the best way to correct this would be to establish a Commission on Indian Affairs so that their problems could properly be taken care of, even though there are roughly only some 500 Indians, I understand, in the State of Connecticut. They deserve the proper consideration of the State of Connecticut. Because my feeling is that they were here before we were and they most certainly deserve the same kind of treatment that we do. So I speak in favor of 8967. I would also like to speak in favor of Senate Bill No. 444 which was introduced by myself. There have been some problems apparently, with the proper care and funding of the Day Care Centers that take care of the mentally retarded children. And this Bill
