SENATOR CUTILLO:

Mr. President, this bill will allow the cities and towns throughout the State of Connecticut, who renovate schools to be reimbursed by the State of Connecticut. As it stands right now, of course, new construction is reimbursable. This would allow the municipality to refurbish and therefore receive monies from the State as it would have if it were new construction.

THE CHAIR:

Question is on passage of the bill, as amended. Will you remark further? If not, all those in favor I'm sorry, I didn't see you, Senator Finney.

SENATOR FINNEY:

I wonder if I could ask Senator Cutillo, does this involve more money than we are now paying for towns renovating and doing schools?

SENATOR CUTILLO:

Through you, Mr. President, to the gracious lady from the 36th. Yes, it would. Because it does not take in the new construction. It takes in in lieu of new construction, refurbishing. So it is new money that we are talking about.

THE CHAIR:

Will you remark further? If not, the question is on passage of the bill as amended. All those in favor signify by saying, "aye". Opposed, "nay". The ayes have it. The bill, as amended, is passed.

I move acceptance and passage of the bill, Mr. President. This bill merely adds to the statute that an authorized official, of the Department of Correction may use physical force in making arrests.

CAL. NO. 1174. File No. 1686. Favorable report of the joint committee on Education. Substitute Senate Bill 1677. An Act Concerning Consumption of Alcoholic Beverages at the University of Connecticut.

SENATOR HOULEY:

Mr. President, representing the Chairman of Education, I move for the acceptance of the joint committee's favorable report and passage of the bill.

This bill allows any college or university in Connecticut to apply and obtain a license to sell beer. Consumption of such beverage shall be on the premises by students, faculty and staff and their guests. Many people will ask, why the bill? And basically, the bill is aimed at preventing to use college terminology, shoot. Shoot, Mr. President, is where one gets a group of people and they go to a newighboring town, obviously being of legal age, and make a session of embibing of alcoholic beverages, rather than have one beer or two beers or possibly three beers and then go back to your business. You get a date or you go stag whatever the case, and you shoot to Willimantic or you shoot to this town or you shoot to that town and make a full day of it.
