#### BERNARD AVCOLLIE, 94th District:

Mr. Speaker, I move acceptance of the joint committee's favorable report and passage of the bill.

#### MR. SPEAKER:

Will you remark?

#### BERNARD AVCOLLIE, 94th District:

The Clerk has Senate Amendment Schedule "A", which I would summarize, Mr. Speaker.

#### MR. SPEAKER:

Will the gentleman please outline Senate Amendment Schedule "A" after the Clerk calls it.

#### THE CLERK:

Senate Amendment Schedule "A" adopted by the Senate on June 1st.

#### BERNARD AVCOLLIE 94th District:

Mr. Speaker, in order to explain the amendment I'd have to note with regard to the primary bill, Mr. Speaker, that the bill, itself, would permit schools, towns or districts, that do not have high schools and junior high schools within its

boundaries to transport to private schools within the towns to which they are transporting to public schools and to towns adjacent to them. The Senate Amendment would permit them a little more latitude in providing for the transportation of students to towns adjacent to the towns in which the public schools are located. It is a rather technical amendment which does broaden the scope of the bill itself, Mr. Speaker, and I would urge its passage.

#### MR. SPEAKER:

Are there further remarks on the amendment? All those in favor indicate by saying aye, opposed? Amendment "A" is adopted.

#### BERNARD AVCOLLIE, 94th District:

Mr. Speaker, the bill before you is another transportation bill to non-public schools but in effect it seeks to correct a deletion which we made in the statutes in 1969 and found much to our dismay we had a number of non-public school students off busses that they had been riding for a number of years. This bill returns the language to the act which we deleted in 1969 and in addition it adds the last section of the file which provides that any town or school district, regional school district, may, at its own discretion, transport students to non-public schools in the same manner as the transportation they are affording the students to public schools, in cases where the regional school district or the town does not have a high school within its boundaries. The bill provides that

these towns or regional school districts may provide the transportation at their discretion. It is, in a sense, local option with regard to the school board but if they do decide to provide the transportation then, in that event, they may apply for the similar reimbursements that they applied for when providing transportation to public school students. It's a good bill, Mr. Speaker, it does not effect many towns, it perhaps effects 2 or 3 regional school districts, one of them with which members on both sides of the aisle are quite interested and I would urge passage and at this time, yield to Rep. Dice, who also has an interest in this bill.

Mr. Speaker, I also support this bill. I think Mr. Avcollie has put it well. I add nothing to it so we can get onto the business of the day but it is a good bill and it should pass. Thank you.

Mr. President, the bill as a whole in this last part that is amended, it deals with towns that do not have high schools of their own. And have to transport students to a high school outside of their town. And it merely authorizes on a discretionary basis those towns to transport pupils to non-public high schools. And it would allow them to transport to schools located in towns adjacent to the town doing the transporting. Or to a town where they transport to a public high school. Or a town adjacent there-I move adoption of the amendment.
