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physical therapists and podiatrists the right to practice the profession through the medium of a professional service corporation under legislation which was adopted in the 1969 session. The statute preserves the elements of the personal professional liability and the responsibility of a professional person providing services through such a corporation. This is a good bill, Mr. Speaker, and I move its adoption.

MR. SPEAKER:

Will you remark further? If not, all those in favor of the bill will indicate by saying aye, those opposed? The bill is passed.

THE CLERK:

Calendar No. 204. Substitute for House Bill No. 5745. An Act Concerning Reports to the State Board of Education.

DAVID LAVINE, 73rd District:

Mr. Speaker, I move the acceptance of the joint committee's favorable report. Mr. Speaker, the Clerk has an amendment.

MR. SPEAKER:

Question is on acceptance and passage, the Clerk has an amendment, will the Clerk please read the amendment?

THE CLERK:

House Amendment Schedule "A". In line 17, after the word "district" delete the comma and insert a period, and delete the remainder of line 17 and all of line 18.

DAVID LAVINE, 73rd District:

Mr. Speaker, I move the acceptance of the amendment.

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MR. SPEAKER:

Question is on adoption of the amendment. Will you remark?

DAVID LAVINE, 73rd District:

Yes, Mr. Speaker. The deletion of the words together with such other information as maybe be required by state and federal law. The feeling is that we will require the acceptance of state and federal law without having to put it into our statutes. We assume we are all law-abiding and follow with the statutes as required. I move that we strike those two lines and accept the amendment.

MR. SPEAKER:

Question is on adoption of House Amendment Schedule "A", will you remark further? If not, all those in favor will indicate by saying aye, opposed? The amendment is adopted. The Chair rules the amendment is technical.

DAVID LAVINE, 73rd District:

Mr. Speaker, I move the acceptance of the joint committee's favorable report as amended by Schedule "A".

MR. SPEAKER:

Question is on acceptance and passage as amended by House Amendment Schedule "A", will you remark?

DAVID LAVINE, 73rd District:

Mr. Speaker, very briefly, what the substitute bill 5745 does is change the date that the reports of the board members of the boards of education, local and regional, be transmitted to the secretary of the State Board of Education, that there's

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a change of date there from the 15th, which is now is, to the 1st of October. The second thing it does is makes a change within a portion of the report, which is to be sent to the secretary of the State Board of Education. Right now the names, the addresses and the annual salary of each teacher and superintendent and principal is to be sent, there is the words, the equivalent thereof, to be added, which is the equivalent of any salary being earned. This might be anything which is indicated on the income tax such as a car, if any superintendent is fortunate enough to have a vehicle at his disposal, or any other type of equivalent salary. The final part adds the words to teacher, principal or superintendent, the words or other certified person for this reporting service. This would bring in people such as guidance counselors and any other person who is certified by the state education department. In essence, these are three rather technical additions which clarify this particular portion of the law. I move that we accept.

MR. SPEAKER:

Will you remark further? If not, the question is on acceptance and passage of the bill, as amended...oh, excuse me.

ALBERT PROVENZANO, 127th District:

Mr. Speaker, through you to the gentleman, may I ask a question? Since I do not have the amendment before me, does the amendment in any way restrict the information which goes to the Secretary of State?

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Does the gentleman from the 73rd care to respond.

DAVID LAVINE, 73rd District:

Mr. Speaker, the information does not go to the Secretary of State, it goes to the secretary of the state board of education. And this is the information which the secretary of the state board of education has, in fact, been getting over the course of the many years which this reporting service has been in effect.

ALBERT PROVENZANO, 127th District:

That was not the question I asked. I asked, does this, in any way, restrict that information which goes to the Secretary of the State Board of Education?

DAVID LAVINE, 73rd District:

Mr. Speaker, there is nothing within the specific portion of this act which restricts this information and, in fact, this information is necessary and that's why it is required. It's necessary that even we of the education committee of the General Assembly have access to it in making determinations and in plans for future educational programs.

MR. SPEAKER:

Will you remark further? If not, the question is on acceptance of the joint committee's favorable report and passage of the bill as amended by House Amendment Schedule "A". All those in favor will indicate by saying aye, opposed? The bill is passed as amended.

THE CHAIR:

Senator Mondani:

SENATOR MONDANI:

Mr. President, I move acceptance of the Committee's Report and passage of the bill in concurrence with the House, as amended by House Amendment Sch. A.

THE CHAIR:

Will you remark?

SENATOR MONDANI:

Mr. President, this is a technical change in the Statute. It deals with reports that are filed with the State Board of Education. The Amendment, made in the House deletes the capitalized print in line 17 and 18. It removes the provision which states together with other information as may be required by state or federal law. It actually is superfluous and isn't necessary. If its required obviously they are going to gather it. What this does is change the reporting date to, from the 15th to the 1st of October when other reports are due. It uses the word or equivielent after salary because in some instances a contractural annual salary isn't available. Its a part time salary. And it expands the definition to other certified person to pick up everyone holding a teaching certificate.

THE CHAIR:

The question is on passage of the bill. Will you remark further?

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If not all those in favor of passage of the bill signify by saying aye. AYE. OPPOSED nay. The ayes have it. The bill is passed.

The last piece of business that the Clerk has marked ready is on page 4, top of the page. Cal. No. 202, File No. 162. HB7512

THE CHAIR:

Senator Buckley.

SENATOR BUCKLEY:

Mr. President, I move acceptance of the joint committee's favorable report and passage of the bill.

THE CHAIR:

Will you remark?

SENATOR BUCKLEY:

This bill although it doesn't show because of the lack of metallics or brackets merely extends the time that the, extends the period of time the bonds may be issued by the Town of Manchester for acquisition of the Manchester Water Company for 25 to 30 years. And extends the interest rate that these bonds may yield. And places that burden upon the town rather than fixing it by Statute.

THE CHAIR:

Question is on passage of the bill. Will you remark further? If not all those in favor of passage signify by saying aye. AYE. Opposed nay. The ayes have it. The bill is passed.

THE CLERK:

There is no further business on the Clerk's desk.

**JOINT
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In 1961, the state reimbursement was established at 12¢ per clock hour of attendance. There has been no increase since in this area. Adult education is as much a responsibility of the state as is elementary and secondary education. With passage of this bill, it is estimated that town reimbursement would be 28¢ per clock hour. This would be comparable to the state's share for public elementary and secondary education.

I urge you to support HB5748.

I have here a series of bills which are technical bills for the most part - Act Concerning reports to the State Board of Education, HB5745 which I would urge you to support. This bill removes the requirements for submitting post office addresses of individual teachers to the state board of education and at the same time will permit the board to collect information about personnel that may be pertinent under changing education and conditions. There are no costs associated with this bill and there will be savings in clerical time and effort at both the state and local level.

I urge you also to support HB5746, An Act Concerning Free Instructional Supplies, Materials and Equipment. Passage of this act will insure more adequately that children will be provided books, materials, supplies, and equipment necessary for their instruction. At this time some school systems require that children purchase some supplies, supplementary instructional materials, and similar items. Children unable to pay for such items either go without or are subject to a means test. Such practices are essentially contrary to the Constitution of the state which requires that "there shall always be free public elementary and secondary schools in the state" and that this principle "shall be implemented by appropriate legislation."

I like also to urge your support for Act Concerning Enumeration of Children, HB5753. Cities and towns need more adequate lead time in planning and organizing schools to accommodate incoming children. This act will establish the ages with reference to January 1 and have the enumeration take place in the Spring. An additional benefit will be provided most communities who also use January 1 to establish ages of incoming children, since a source of confusion to parents will be eliminated.

Also urge your support HB5750 another bill which does not involve any appropriation. This is An Act Concerning School Registers. Since the need for keeping school registers to determine average daily membership was eliminated by the 1969 General Assembly, the provisions of Section 10-150a of the statutes needs to be repealed. With such repeal the definitions and procedures for establishing average daily membership will be in harmony with the ADM act. All teachers who are present, or former teachers, can now cheer.
