Amendments to the Act Concerning the Status of Children Conceived Through Artificial Insemination, File No. 599, favorable report of the Committee on Judiciary.

MR. TULISANO (29th):

I move for acceptance of the joint committee's favorable report and passage of the bill.

THE DEPUTY SPEAKER:

Question is on acceptance and passage. Will you remark?

MR. TULISANO (29th):

Yes, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, this bill would make some-- correct some technical errors in the bill which this legislature passed last year. As an example, in section 4 there were references to incorrect paragraphs or section numbers and this particular--this new bill would correct that. In addition, it makes it very clear although that was the intent by amendment last year that this act does nothing but restate the law for children conceived through artificial insemination as being legitimate children. Further, it makes it very clear that if a child conceived by artificial insemination is born outside the state but the parents in the domiciliary of Connecticut and only temporarily out of the State, then that child--the legitimacy of the child would be determined by the law of Connecticut thereby making that child legitimate.

I move for passage of the bill.

The reason for this amendment is to clarify what, I think is obviously the intent of that paragraph. By removing the reference to being out of the jurisdiction temporarily we're attempting to avoid a conflict for a court battle over whether or not a person is in fact temporarily out of the state. If a person is a domiciliary of Connecticut, they are in fact a domiciliary and that fact by itself without reference to being out of the state temporarily would make clear the status of the child.

Mr. Speaker, I just read House "A" and I believe it raises no objection with myself and makes the bill very clear.

Mr. President, I'm going to vote against the bill, and I hope some of my colleagues do.
