Mr. President, standard to a glutination test within not less than 30 and more than 60 days after livestock is imported into the State of Connecticut. Likewise, it provides that these tests may be provided and may be performed by livestock inspectors from the Department of Agriculture. Finally, it provides that non-registered cattle who have not been vaccinated between the ages of 3 and 7 months, be required to do so for livestock imported from outside the State of Connecticut. COMR. PAC (Continued): Protection agency for the Town of Wallingford. This bill deals with the reconstruction of the dam that was recently breached during the heavy percipitation of a few weeks ago. And 147 towns in the state have their own Inlands-Wetlands Commissions. In 22 of these towns the Department of Environmental Protection is the agency of record and in the case of Wallingford, they have opted for a program that's administered by us.

And then that we support the bill. The reconstruction of the dam will continue in the problem that has to do with the productive wildlife and plantlife of some in the area. If this continues to be breached it'll dry up the area to the north of the dam and, of course, will have the effects on the wildlife and plantlife in the area.

The reconstruction of the dam will not have a significant effect in a bathing flooding condition. I will make that clear. And it does not qualify for flood -- federal flood control funds because there's three -- and it's a privately-owned dam -- we call it privately-owned although it's owned by the municipalities, however, that's the definition that we use when it's owned by someone other than the state. It does not qualify for repairs under our dam repair program and it would qualify for funding under the federal land and water conservation program. This is a program that calls for 50% funding from federal sources, 25% from state sources and an additional 25% from local funds. The federal government has just now launching a new program called the Urban Aid to Recreation Programs for the local cities and the effect of this program is that it will make available \$150,000,000 throughout this country. This funding will become available some time in August. If Wallingford qualifies for this particular program, it would be eligible up to 85% of the total funding of reconstruction.

House Bill 7780. This is a bill that funds for the erection of structures in the placement of fill. The DEP has regulatory authority over all structural facilities in coastal and waters. This bill would require us to consider the of coastal resources before issuing a permit. In essence, it would passage of the coastal area management bill that you have before you and we think it's a good bill.

House Bill 7724. This is an act appropriating funds for an impact study of the Rooster River Flood Control Project in Bridgeport. Now we have done an EIS, that's an environmental impact evaluation of the Rooster River and this was completed
