Every time we were going to repave a road, this law required that we actually go to the planning and zoning commission in town to get approval for simply resurfacing a road. So this is simply trying to simplify that process and clarify it.

REP. AMAN (14th):

Yes. And looking at this, while I -- many of my feelings on this bill is similar to the one that's -- we just recently passed in that we're telling a town to go ahead and do what its own job is. I will be supporting it. I really wonder again like the other bill that this sort of legislation really is necessary.

I can see right now if opponents of a project would like to cause problems, they could use the language in this bill. Also, the bill does call under

current language that two thirds majority of the

Legislature, they can completely override the planning
and zoning commission. They also, if 35 days goes by
from the time the legislative body asks the planning
and zoning commission for approval, they don't
respond, approval is always given. I wish very much
that same 35-day period could be extended to many of
the state agencies, that if they didn't reply within
35 days they would also have automatic approvals. I
think the municipalities would be very happy to see
that, but I will be supporting the bill, and I thank
you very much for bringing it up.
