This bill will give a short period of time for
sales agents that do owe monies to the State of
Connecticut to come forward, that are lottery agents
within the State of Connecticut. And that time frame
period is about 60 days, Mr. Speaker, and we feel that
it's a way to also help out delinquent lottery agents
that we have within our state, to bring in additional

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revenue into the state.

NANCY ALDERMAN: That's a good point. Good point.

SENATOR DEBICELLA: The other question I had, Nancy, was, you know, in looking at this, what are the regulations from a federal level right now that are tanning salons? Is there something nationwide that is either been or being done on this?

NANCY ALDERMAN: You know, I really would like to address this in a way that hopefully we can get our hands around. The only things in this country that we test are drugs and pesticides. Everything else gets out there. And the problem is, everything gets out there, and then everything has a constituency and it's up to nonprofits, on the whole, whatever, to figure out what's really harmful, bring it up to legislator's who then, by that time, have to deal with not only people who are telling you things are harmful but then all the lobbyists and all the constituents that come in and tell you why you have to keep what you've got.

This is true for tannings salons, now, who've been around for quite awhile that nobody sort of stopped. It's true for outdoor wood furnaces, which is a new industry, which is now out there.

So your question is what has the federal government done? They are going to subject to the same things that state government is. They, too, get lobbied. They, too, have interests. They, too, claim what about jobs. And so, what do we do? Usually, the federal government is more heavily lobbied than the state government. So my guess is we don't have any regulations that are protective and our regulations, as they now stand, are completely unprotected.

SENATOR DEBICELLA: -- and one of my worries when I look at bills like this is, you know, to say there -- I'm sure there are studies out there that show that tanning salons are very harmful for your health but without having, you know, the FDA or someone like that actually look this --

NANCY ALDERMAN: Oh, I'm sorry. The CDC has already come and said that tanning salons are extremely dangerous. The World Health Organization, as I said earlier, is listing tanning salons with cigarettes, arsenic and asbestos. Our group is a group of doctors and public health professionals. I'm just here bringing forth what they have asked for. And -- so there is tons of material out there telling us that something must be done.

And, as I said, the beauty of the next person who's going to testify, as -- she can tell you, as a teenager, how she used these tanning salons knowing nothing.

SENATOR DEBICELLA: And I think the thing that we need to be careful of, as legislators, to your point, is to make sure that we are bringing the best science to the table and my worry is that, you know, in some -- the bill is relatively vague as it reads right now. Some of the things you've proposed are, quite frankly, a little extreme towards the tanning industry and I understand that based your belief of the science behind it. Because it sounds like the science that you have behind it, you're saying is as bad cigarettes.

I'm saying this, as a legislators, who has not reports so, you know, my worry in talking about some of the things that -- what your proposing would seriously damage the tanning industry, which I think you would admit is your intent
