REP. WIDLITZ: Kelly Murphy, followed by Representative Gale Lavielle.

REBECCA BOMBERO: Good afternoon. Ms. Murphy could not be here today due to illness. My name is Rebecca Bombero. I'm the Legislative Director for the City of New Haven. I'm here on behalf of Ms. Murphy, our Development Administrator, and the Mayor. We're here today to testify in support of H.B. 5500, An Act Concerning An Expansion of Tax Incremental Financing.

With few options for large-scale capital financing, economic development officials across the state are exploring more creative ways to put necessary infrastructure and fill financing gaps in development projects. The proposed bill expands the traditional use of tax increment financing underwritten by future property taxes to look at blended financing from property taxes, sales taxes, income taxes, all of which are generated from net new economic activity. This approach was informed by innovative economic development TIF and grant programs in Missouri, New Jersey and Massachusetts, but is specific for the needs of Connecticut. The proposed program would

dedicate up to 75 percent of incremental state and local tax revenue streams, the new revenue from these developments to supplement other investment sources.

The balance of this new net tax revenue, 25 percent would go to the state and local general funds. By way of example, there is an opportunity to develop the medical District in New Haven because of the high quality of research and health care activities now taking place. To increase the job and tax base within the Center City will require significant investment in roads and public infrastructure. The project has the potential to create up to 7,000 to 9300 net new permanent jobs and would produce up to 1 billion in economic output, annual tax income revenue of up -- income tax revenue up to 25 million, and 51 million in sales tax receipts all because of an investment in globally competitive industrial sector.

Upon review of the proposal, we recommend that the Committee consider providing for these bonds to be issued by any of the agencies authored -- authorized under Chapters 130, 132, or pursuant to Section 32-32(zz) of the general statutes and the revenue to remit to the issuing agency. And it is very important to carefully consider the language and practical applications of such proposal, and therefore we would be happy to work with the Committee on this exciting opportunity.

I have attached a presentation on the medical District project and more information on this and other projects are available at our web site.

REP. WIDLITZ: Thank you, Rebecca. And we hope that Kelly is feeling better.

The project that you have outlined here looks very exciting and we've had the opportunity to take a look at this before. Is this contingent upon the Federal transportation bill that's now being -- going through Congress, or not?

REBECCA BOMBERO: That would be one possible funding source. We were fortunate enough to receive TIGER grants on the last round of funding. That will be used for a congruent parcel at 100 college street which has the potential to generate 7 -- between 700 and 1100 jobs, and I believe it's 25 million in that economic activity.

REP. WIDLITZ: Thank you. Representative Lemar.

REP. LEMAR: Thank you, Ms. Bombero. And I, too, am sorry that Kelly cannot join us today.

We talk about the economic activity that's occurred in New Haven over the last five to ten years and how it is outpaced what we've seen in a lot of communities across New England and the northeast. And largely it's because we've exhausted whatever creative means available to us as a city. Under Kelly's leadership, she's negotiated some of the, the most pronounced and high-profile development deals that we've seen in the state, including 360 State Street. What we're dealing with is this incredible piece of land that sits in the center of our city, which should be one of the most tax generating, job generating sectors of our city. And

unfortunately, due to the tremendous cost necessary to bring it up to par, we have not been -- unable to capitalize on its unique location, its ability to attract wide-scale private investment, and utilizing the state's resources in this manner.

Developing a TIF Program that allows places like New Jersey to compete against us for these types of medical and education related businesses is really putting us in a bad position to continue our growth in New Haven. So, I salute the work that Ms. Murphy has done to come up with yet another way for the city to develop our infrastructure, but utilizing the Federal transportation bill is going to present a problem, as we know. We receive TIGER 2 dollars that have allowed us to move forward with the redevelopment of the roadway infrastructure and to create 100 College Street, but there are no future dollars allocated toward New Haven in upcoming transportation bills. And this type of mechanism is the only way to capitalize on the state's investment, the Federal investment today, and the local investment that we've made.

So, I thank you for coming up and outlining what the vision is for the city and how the state can be a partner with us at a very low cost where it allows them to recoup all of the future net tax increments.

Senator Daily, Rep. Widlitz, and members of the Committee, thank you for the opportunity to testify in support of HB 5500 AN ACT CONCERNING AN EXPANSION OF TAX INCREMENTAL FINANCING.

With few options for large scale capital financing, economic development officials across the state are exploring more creative ways to build necessary infrastructure and fill financing gaps in development projects. The proposed bill expands the traditional use of tax increment financing (underwritten by future property tax) to look at blended financing from property tax, sales and income taxes, all of which are generated from net new economic activity. This approach was informed by innovative economic development TIF and grant programs in Missouri, New Jersey and Massachusetts, but is specific for the needs of Connecticut. The proposed program would dedicate up to 75% of certain incremental state and local tax revenue streams, paid over up to 20 years, to supplement other investment sources. The balance of net new tax revenues would go to the state and local general fund(s).

By way of example, there is an opportunity to develop the medical district in New Haven because of the high quality of research and health care activities now taking place. To increase the job and tax base within a center city will require a significant investment in roads and public infrastructure. The project has the potential to create 7,000 to 9,300 net new permanent jobs and would produce up to \$1 BILLION in economic output, annual income tax revenue of up to \$25M and \$51M in sales tax receipts all because of an investment in a globally-competitive industrial sector

Upon review of the proposal we would recommend that the Committee consider providing for these bonds to be issued by any of the agencies authorized under Chapters 130, 132 or pursuant to section 32-32zz of the General Statutes and the revenue to remit to the issuing agency. It very important to carefully consider the language and practical applications of such proposal and therefore we would be happy to work with the committee on this exciting opportunity.







MEDICAL DISTRICT PLAN—10 YEAR VISION






7 MEDICAL DISTRICT DEVELOPMENT OPPORTUNITY

- Building on the catalyzing development at 100 College Street, the remaining available land provides potential to almost **double the size** of the medical district in the next 10 years:
 - 7,000-9,300 net new permanent jobs,
 - Up to \$1 B potential additional annual economic output,
 - Annual income tax revenue up to \$25 million, sales tax to \$51 million
 - Additional build out possible throughout remainder of district.
- ***New Haven's new Medical District will be a showcase urban center for Biomedical Research, remaining competitive with re-envisioned hubs like Cambridge, Pittsburgh, & Cleveland and complementing the investments in Farmington/Storrs to create a I-91 research corridor that rivals any metropolitan region in the nation.***

MEDICAL DISTRICT - NEAR TERM

1. Request for Direct Governor's Office/DECD point person to facilitate the advancement of this plan.
2. Multi-Tax TIF Legislation Approval

⌘ Provides impactful funding for municipal infrastructure and development projects. This TIF proposal blends both Municipal and State revenue to provide gap financing for up to 20% of project costs by bonding against up to 75% of net new incremental tax revenue. Based on a model implemented in New Jersey's 2009 Stimulus Act and City will initiate the introduction of the proposed legislation in the next session.

3. Funding for Design & Construction of Infrastructure \$45 m

⌘ This funding would provide the \$2.5 million of design fees to finalize construction documents on the full district infrastructure plan, as well as approximately \$42.25 million for construction costs to build out the full district (not including Rt 34 and Church Street South). A final estimate will be provided during the final design phase.

4. Bioscience Career Ladder Workforce Training \$ 3 m

⌘ Funding to provide initial 2-year curriculum and staff oversight to develop a targeted training program at Gateway Community College and other programs to advance workforce into future jobs in the district.

5. Enabling Authority to Convey Rt 34, College St to Orange St for Economic Development



⌘ In order to provide critical expansion space to the 100 College Street development, the next parcel in the Rt 34 corridor. City will request enabling authority in next legislative session.

9 MEDICAL DISTRICT - NEAR TERM (2)

6. Union Station TOD Project Advancement (in process)

City of New Haven in coordination with State DOT to advance this project.

7. Church Street South Project Advancement (in process)

Project in pre-development phase, and financing needs will be raised in the future.

8. Future full build of Rt 34 infrastructure /Downtown Crossing

State's participation in Phase I of the Rt 34 infrastructure has been instrumental to leveraging additional federal and private funds. Future participation in the remainder of the corridor will be required.
