


This bill will provide essential services and funding that will advance important public health services at the local level.

Testimony of the Connecticut Association of Directors of Health
In Support of Raised Bill 188: An Act Concerning Financial Assistance to
Local Health Departments for Lead Poisoning Prevention
 To the Distinguished Co-Chairs and Members of the Public Health Committee
 March 7, 2012

Good afternoon, Representative Ritter, Senator Gerratana and members of the Public Health Committee. My name is Patrick McCormack and I am President of the Connecticut Association of Directors of Health (CADH) and the Director of the Uncas Health District, serving the towns of Bozrah, Griswold, Lisbon, Montville, Norwich, Sprague, and Voluntown.

CADH, on behalf of Connecticut's local health departments, supports Raised Bill 188, An Act Concerning Financial Assistance to Local Health Departments for Lead Poisoning Prevention. As you are aware, in 2007 the Connecticut General Assembly passed legislation to establish and administer a program of financial assistance to local health departments for lead poisoning prevention and control services.

The overall reduction in childhood lead levels over the last three decades has been one of public health's great success stories, both nationally and in Connecticut. Local health departments have been instrumental in helping reduce the deleterious effects of childhood lead poisoning. Specifically, local health departments manage cases, conduct epidemiologic and environmental investigation, and order remediation or abatement of properties that resulted in unacceptable lead levels in children tested.

Raised Bill 188 would streamline the funding process to ensure that local health departments receive, in a timely and direct manner, the resources needed to continue case management services, lead poisoning educational services, environmental health services, health education services, and participation in the Department of Public Health's data collection system with respect to lead poisoning prevention and control. Accordingly, CADH supports Raised Bill 188.

CADH is a nonprofit organization comprised of Connecticut's 77 local health departments and districts. Since its incorporation in 1996, CADH has and continues to convene, engage, mobilize, and support Connecticut's local health departments and districts to strengthen and assure efficient and effective delivery of public health services. Local health directors are the statutory agents of the Commissioner of Public Health and are critical providers of essential public health services at the local level in Connecticut. Senate Bill – SB 188 - An Act Concerning Financial Assistance to Local Health Departments for Lead Poisoning Prevention.

The Department of Public Health supports Senate Bill No. 188. The Department would like to thank the Public Health Committee for raising the Department's bill.

The Department of Public Health (DPH) delivers approximately \$1,000,000 to municipal and district health departments annually for the purpose of preventing and controlling childhood lead poisoning. Under our current practice funds are typically delivered to the health departments/districts six months into the fiscal year. In an effort to improve the process our Department worked with the Connecticut Association of Directors of Health to develop language that would assist in our delivery of funds.

This bill will enable the Department to distribute these funds to our community partners in a more efficient and timely manner. The timely delivery of funds will enable health departments to continue services without interruption which is of benefit to CT's communities and children. Additionally, streamlining the delivery process will save both the state and municipal/district health departments' administrative time and effort.

The Department respectfully requests amending the language to delete the sentence in lines 45-47 "The Department of Public Health shall approve such educational materials before the local health department distributes such materials." Pursuant to section 19a-110 (d) of the Connecticut General statutes, the Department is responsible for developing and delivering educational messaging and materials to local health departments in an effort to ensure that a standardized approach is used by local health departments when responding to childhood lead poisoning cases.

Thank you for your consideration of the Department's view on this bill.

This law will put into place eligibility criteria for local health departments seeking funding from the Department of Public Health to help finance lead poisoning prevention and remediation service.

Madam President, I would just like to comment. We have many advocates in our community and in our state who are concerned about the levels of lead perhaps in our homes in our communities and currently there is those advocates who have been tracking lead levels. I know many people in this Chamber and also in the House are very concerned about this.

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This bill will go a long way to addressing their concerns in establishing an effective protocol.

SENATOR WELCH:

Thank you Madam President.

I -- I just rise temp -- briefly to again voice my support for this bill and -- and thank Senator Gerratana for her hard work on what's a very important issue to families and to children especially.

So thank you Madam President.

Will you remark? Will you remark? Senator Slossberg.

SENATOR SLOSSBERG:

Yes, thank you Madam President.

I also too wanted to rise and to thank Senator Gerratana and Senator Welch and the members of the Public Health Committee for moving this bill along. Lead poisoning is something that continues to plague our state. We've done much better in the last ten years. In fact we've cut down the rates of lead poisoning in our state by nearly a half.

This is one of those nefarious health issues that really affects our future and our children's future in that it causes irreversible brain damage and when -- this is one of those rare opportunities where when we as a government act we have the ability to actually eradicate a health problem.

We're well on our way. This program sets us further down

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the path and I'm proud and thankful to support this bill today. Thank you.
