REP. ARESIMOWICZ (30th):

Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, I move for
the adoption of the resolution. It is self
explanatory.

SPEAKER SHARKEY:

The question before the Chamber is on adoption.
Will you remark? If not, I'll try your minds. All
those in favor of House Resolution number 16 please
signify by saying aye.

REPRESENTATIVES:

Aye.

SPEAKER SHARKEY:

Those opposed, nay. The ayes have it. The

resolution is adopted. At this time the Chair will appoint the committee to inform the Senate. The Chair will appoint Representative Arthur O'Neill, Representative Mary Mushinsky and Representative Juan Candelaria. Representative Aresimowicz.

REP. ARESIMOWICZ (30th):

Yes, Mr. Speaker, at this time I ask we stand in recess as we await the Senate.

SPEAKER SHARKEY:

The question -- we'll stand in recess.

(On motion of Senator Aresimowicz of the 30th District, the Senate at 10:14 a.m., recessed.)

SPEAKER SHARKEY:

Will the House please come to order. Members take your seats. The Chair recognizes the Dean of the House, Representative Mary Mushinsky.

REP. MUSHINSKY (85th):

Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, I'm pleased to report that the committee to inform the Senate that the House has organized has met and called upon the Lieutenant Governor and told the Senate that we are ready to meet in joint convention. The 2011 regular

session of the House of Representatives was concluded in accordance with Article 3 Section 2 of the Constitution of the State of Connecticut.

SPEAKER SHARKEY:

Representative Mushinsky, I believe there was a typo in your remarks. I think it's the 2013 regular session.

REP. MUSHINSKY (85th):

Sleep deprivation, Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER SHARKEY:

Thank you, Madam. Thank you for your report. A job well done. Ladies and gentlemen, it's my welcome -- my pleasure to welcome to the dais none other than our long-time friend here in this House of Representatives, our Lieutenant Governor, Nancy Wyman.

LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR NANCY WYMAN:

Thank you. All right. All right. All right. Sit down. Sit down. Thank you. Thank you very, very much. Please sit down. Sit down. That's it. Thank you all very, very much. Thank you. Thank you. Okay. Okay. All right. All right. All right.

I've already messed things up. I got here and I took the hammer and put it on left side closer to the -- my friends on my left that happen to be on the

right but it's okay. So they -- I've already messed them but I will -- at this time I will call the joint convention. Please come to order. And that's when -- that's when I'm supposed to use this.

Members and guests please rise, direct your attention to Father Nock who will lead us in prayer. Father.

SENATE CHAPLAIN, REVEREND JAMES J. NOCK:

Let us pray. Almighty Father, we ask your blessing on our Joint Convention as we come together this morning to bring to a close the Legislative session of 2013. This has been a very difficult, a very emotional session. You have guided us through it all with the courage to bring about the most comprehensive gun control legislation in the country, bringing peace and security to our people, with the wisdom to bring our higher education into a new realm assuring needed education and jobs for the future.

With the patience to achieve a two-year budget, assuring the State security and hope for the future. With the faith to know that in the State by the long tidal river, we can achieve the same greatness in the future that we achieved in the past by discussing, sharing and accomplishing the future of our State and

doing it together. And we ask this of you who live
and reign forever and ever. Amen.

LEGISLATORS:

Amen.

LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR NANCY WYMAN:

Thank you, Father Nock. Thank you so much. At
this time I'd ask our Speaker of the House, our
friend, Brendan Sharkey to please lead us in the
Pledge of Allegiance.

SPEAKER SHARKEY:

I pledge allegiance to the Flag of the United
States of America, and to the Republic for which it
stands, one Nation under God, indivisible, with
liberty and justice for all.

LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR NANCY WYMAN:

Thank you. Please sit down. Have a seat. I
know that -- you know to the public and probably to a
lot of us the legislative process and, especially these
final few days can sometimes look like mass confusion.
And make no mistake they definitely are times when it
really is. But that is what happens when all of us
here who want the best for our State and our
communities have to reach consensus on what that means
and how it should be translated into the intricate

details of a bill.

It certainly is not always pretty but what really matters is that after the dust settles we have worked together to move our State forward on countless issues that affect the lives of those we serve. And what is also important is that we come out of these -- these sessions with a mutual respect for each other, with old and new friends intact no matter what side of the aisle we sit.

I want to congratulate first of all the staff. As a former staff member no matter what anybody says we can't do it without you. Thank you very, very much. I also want to take a moment to congratulate all of the elected officials in the House and the Senate. You have done a great job. Thank you for doing the work you have done during the session. You have ensured that our children achieve in their classrooms.

You've achieved so much in getting better medical care for all who need it. And last night and the beginning of the session you helped the families of Newtown deal with the tragedy that saddened us all. We have achieved much that will benefit the people of Connecticut for years to come. And I thank them for

allowing us to serve them.

On a personal note to all of you, most of you know I'm a mother and a grandmother. And I want to thank you for doing what you did to make this State a better state for them to live in. Would you give yourselves a round of applause.

God bless you and thank you. I can't be more proud to call you colleagues and friends. I just hope that all of you grow to love each other as I've grown to love all of you. Thank you. Thank you so very, very much.

And so right now, Mr. Clerk, I have a question to ask you. Is there any business on your -- on your desk right now? There is a Clerk down there isn't he? Okay. Thank you. I can see you now. It's -- Mr. Clerk, I think it's the joint resolution inviting the Governor to attend the joint convention.

THE CLERK:

Joint Convention Resolution number 60, resolution concerning the printing of the -- nope.

LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR NANCY WYMAN:

Nope. Oh no not yet. We haven't finished this yet.

THE CLERK:

That is Joint Convention Resolution number 59, resolution raising a committee of a two senators and two representatives to inform the Governor that the Senate and House of Representatives are in joint convention for the purpose of adjournment, LCO number 8882, introduced by Senate Looney and Representative Aresimowicz!

LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR NANCY WYMAN:

I think I messed up on that. Senator Looney.

SENATOR LOONEY:

Thank you, Madam President. For a brief point of personal privilege before moving the resolution.

LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR NANCY WYMAN:

Please.

SENATOR LOONEY:

I wanted to -- to thank my counterpart, Marjority Leader Aresimowicz, not only for the use of his desk and microphone but for his extraordinary work throughout the entire session and a wonderful partner to work with on everything that -- that we did this session. And also to thank Speaker Sharkey who also represents Hamden as I do that his -- his leadership obviously was superb. And with that, Madam President, would move the resolution raising the committee to

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invite the Governor.

LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR NANCY WYMAN:

The question is on adoption. I will try your minds. All those in favor please signify by saying aye.

LEGISLATORS:

Aye.

LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR NANCY WYMAN:

The resolution -- I forgot to ask if there was any nays, now we don't that. The resolution is adopted on a voice vote. I'd like at this time to appoint four of our leaders, Senator Martin Looney, Senator John McKinney, Senator -- Representative Joe Aresimowicz and Representative Larry Cafero to invite the Governor to attend our joint session. Can we do it quickly guys? I'll know where you really are, John.

At this time I really do want to recognize as -- you know I had -- I'm going off -- off target here. There's a young man in this Chamber right now that probably shouldn't be here at this hour but we're so glad to have him here. I met two days ago and he was out there lobbying for a bill. And I got to tell you the bill passed tonight in the Senate. We're really

glad to have Jack here today. Jack raise your hand.

Thank you, Jack.

Ladies and gentlemen I don't know whose seat he's going to take but one of us has to be careful. I also rise in my pleasure today -- tonight to -- we have been also joined by two of our constitutional officers, Secretary of State, Denise Merrill who you'll hear from next. And our great Treasurer, Denise Nappier.

And I must admit that I looked through the door and I know that I don't even have to stand at ease at this time because they're slowly walking. God they are slow. They are slowly walking in and I have a feeling that the committee to invite the Governor to attend the joint session has fulfilled their duty and here is our Governor. He told me I have to get going. Okay.

So now it's my honor to introduce the man who for the past two and a half years has led us and the people of Connecticut with a vision, his work ethic and his heart. During that time our great State has faced many obstacles and sadly encountered unfathomable evil that took so many beautiful lives from us.

But it is hardship and difficulty that brings out the best in a true leader, a leader who does not tell -- tell you what you think you want to know but will tell you what you really need to know. He's a man that will tell you the truth whether he likes it or not. But ladies and gentlemen I want to tell you he is really a true, true leader, our Governor, our friend, Dannel P. Malloy.

GOVERNOR DANNEP P. MALLOY:

Thank you, Nancy. Thank you. Thank you. Thank you. Thank you very much. Thank you. Listen, please. You've been working hard, let's get to work, get you home. Thank you.

Lieutenant Governor Wyman, thank you very much for your hard work and friendship, Speaker Sharkey, President Williams, Leaders McKinney and Cafero and all of the distinguished legislators who are here. It's always an honor for me to address you in this great Chamber and I thank you for the opportunity.

I want to thank you also for all of the hard work that you've done over the months in service to the people of Connecticut. The chance to make change for the better, to help our communities and our State in challenging times is one of the greatest privileges

our fellow citizens can bestow on us. You have lived up to the trust placed in you, and I want to thank you for your service.

It seems hard to believe that more than five months ago -- or five months I should say have passed since this legislative session began. I think back to that cold day in January when we came together to begin our work, all of us still reeling from the worst tragedy we could possibly have imagined.

Every one of us would give anything to go back to December 14 and prevent what happened that day. But we can't. The best we can do is to go forward in a way that honors those who we have lost. And in the halls of this Capitol this Session, we've seen that commitment to push forward.

We saw it in the Newtown families, whose continued presence here has been an inspiration to all of us. We saw it in the survivors of urban violence, who came here to push for change so that others would not have to feel the pain they carry with them every single day.

Through each and every meeting, during each and every debate, all of us worked to make our State a better and safer place. Make no mistake about it the

bipartisan gun violence prevention bill that we passed will make our State safer. The funding we secured for Project Longevity and other violence reduction efforts will help cities fight senseless violence on our streets.

The debate on gun violence in America is by no means over. We still have much work to do as a nation but we did make progress here in Connecticut. We accomplished these things and by and large, we did it together on a bipartisan basis.

We knew coming into this Session that there were many debates on the horizon, challenges that needed to be dealt with if we were going to continue the progress made in our State over the past two years.

We knew that we had to build on our unprecedented economic development agenda, and we did by passing an historic investment in our State's flagship university. Next Generation Connecticut will usher in a transformational era for the university, one where we get the best and brightest in our State prepared to compete for 21st Century jobs.

We knew we had to continue the hard work of reforming our public schools and we did. The actions we took this Session build on last year's remarkable

work. Think about this, at a time when it would have been easy to cut and run on education we went in another direction and invested nearly half a billion dollars into our public schools, most of it going to chronically struggling districts. Is it enough? Well when it comes to public education there probably is never enough. But working together I know that our kids will have access to great public schools, no matter what city or town they live in.

We knew -- we knew that we had to tackle our State's energy challenges and we did. Working together we took great steps toward our goal of cleaner, cheaper and more reliable energy. We knew -- we knew we had to continue to help the hardworking men and women of our State and we did by raising the minimum wage and beginning to restore the clothing tax exemption, we will help families struggling make ends meet.

We knew we had to keep our commitment to our cities and towns and we did. For the third year in a row we are holding cities and towns harmless so that nothing we do here adds to their property tax burden. We knew we had to find ways for local governments to cooperate and thanks to your -- your work we did. The

M. O. R. E. Commission has put forward a clear path toward increased government efficiency and savings.

We wanted to continue our push to improve public awareness and we did. Thanks to your activism, we are the first State in the country to pass legislation that will ultimately require the labeling of GMOs.

And we also knew that there would be a hard fought battle on the budget. The agreement we reached and forged through honest debate, tough choices and compromise. No budget is perfect, but let's be clear this budget gets the big things right. This budget was done on time. This budget refuses to kick the can down the road and properly funds our State pension obligations, saving us billions of dollars over the next twenty years. This budget invests in jobs and education and complies with generally accepted accounting principles. This budget does all of that and contains no new taxes.

We have much to be proud of. As we work to reinvent ourselves we have created more than 26,000 private sector jobs, the highest rate of private sector job growth over a two-year period since the late 1990s. We still -- we still have a long way to go, but we are making progress.

In a time when partisan gridlock has brought progress to a halt in Washington and -- and to many other places in our country for that matter we've done some great things and we've done them together. Your dedication to the people of this State is the reason progress is being made. Working together, we can and will reinvent our State.

So I say thank you. And may God bless you, may God bless the great State of Connecticut, and may God bless the United States of America.

LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR NANCY WYMAN:

Thank you. At this time, Senator Looney.

SENATOR LOONEY:

Yes, Madam President. I believe the Clerk in possession of -- of another resolution.

LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR NANCY WYMAN:

Mr. Clerk.

THE CLERK:

Joint Convention Resolution number 60, RESOLUTION CONCERNING THE PRINTING OF THE GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE, LCO number 8881 introduced by Senator Looney and Representative Aresimowicz.

LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR NANCY WYMAN:

Senator Looney.

SENATOR LOONEY:

Thank you, Madam President. Before moving of adoption of resolution would want to thank Senator McKinney and Representative Cafero for their courageous leadership throughout the session and working with our President Don Williams and Speaker Sharkey to make this such a session of bipartisan achievement. And I think they deserve great, great credit.

And Madam President, I move adoption of the resolution although I am not certain with -- that with the adopted I think we may have to inquire of Senator Harp and Representative Walker as to whether it contains money for the printing of the message but we will -- we will assume that it does at this point and would move adoption of the resolution.

LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR NANCY WYMAN:

The question is on adoption. I'll try your minds. All in favor please say aye.

LEGISLATORS:

Aye.

LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR NANCY WYMAN:

The -- the others can say whatever you want. The resolution is approved and on a voice vote. Members

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and guests please, direct your attention to Deputy
Chaplain, Reverend Charles Jacobs who will give us the
benediction. Chaplain.

DEPUTY CHAPLAIN REVEREND CHARLES E. JACOBS:

I'll ask you to please bow your heads and pray
for God's blessing. Lord, it's late and we are all
tired.

LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR NANCY WYMAN:

Amen.

DEPUTY CHAPLAIN REVEREND CHARLES E. JACOBS:

Amen. Thank you, Lieutenant Governor. So we
just simply thank you for giving your elected
representatives the wisdom, the courage and the
conviction to work for and on behalf of the people of
Connecticut. Thank You for bringing them together in
the spirit of cooperation and mutual vision. Thank
you for all that was accomplished during this session.
We couldn't have done it without you. Amen.

LEGISLATORS:

Amen.

LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR NANCY WYMAN:

Thank you, Reverend. Thank you, Reverend. Thank
you very, very much. At this point I think this --
Senator Looney.

SENATOR LOONEY:

Madam President, the joint convention having achieved its purpose in hearing and receiving the Governor's message would move that the joint convention stand adjourned.

LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR NANCY WYMAN:



SPEAKER SHARKEY:

Will the House please come to order. Members, staff and guests, please direct your attention to the dais where Guest Chaplain Garland Higgins will lead us in prayer.

ASSISTANT CHAPLAIN REVEREND GARLAND D. HIGGINS:

Almighty and everlasting God, we seek Thy presence as we gather for today's Veto Session. We look to You for all knowledge, guidance, leadership and the power that You can bestow upon us. For all of Your many blessings, we give You thanks and praise.

SPEAKER SHARKEY:

And, Mr. Clerk, this being the veto session, will you please call -- read the call of the session.

THE CLERK:

Yes, Mr. Speaker.

Call reconvening the 2013 regular session of the General Assembly.

WHEREAS, the regular session of the 2013 General Assembly adjourned on June 5, 2013, in accordance with the Constitution of Connecticut; and

WHEREAS, the Governor has disapproved certain bills passed by the regular session of the 2013 General Assembly and has transmitted same to the Secretary of the State with his objections; and

WHEREAS, said bills were not reconsidered by the

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General Assembly or were so disapproved by the Governor after said adjournment;

NOW THEREFORE, as required by Article Third of the Amendments to the Constitution of Connecticut, I hereby call the 2013 Regular Session of the General Assembly to reconvene in session at Hartford on July 22, 2013 at ten o'clock in the morning, for a period not to exceed three days following such reconvening, for the sole purpose of reconsidering and, if the General Assembly so desires, repassing said bills.

It simply requires that DESP and the Bureau within DESP, which deals with missing children information, establish procedures with regards to the confidentiality of any medical information and the public dissemination of that. And it allows for the family to make that decision in terms of what medical information goes public when there is such an alert.

I thank you very much, Madam President.

And would like to yield the floor to Senator Gerratana, please.

I will, Madam President. Thank you so much.

information in that Silver Alert regarding, not just the age and description, but also the weight, the medical diagnosis, and other very personal information.

So I brought it to the attention of Public Safety Committee and I thank very kindly for your advocacy in getting this moved forward, Senator Hartley.

So of course, I'm speaking in favor of the legislation and thank you so much.
