SENATOR MCLACHLAN: Thank you. And through you, Mr. Chairman, if an insert process worked less expensively according to your standard rate structure, do you have any objection to a municipality exercising that option versus the traditional legal notice?

MICHAEL KILLIAN: Let me just repeat to you what I think I heard you say is that you're talking about taking a public notice, you know, printing in a -- what we would call an insert or a flyer, single sheet or multiple page, and then inserting it into the newspaper? You know, we do that now with evaluations. I think it's every ten years you see something that -- but, no, we do not. I think if you looked at the rate cards of all of the newspapers in the State of Connecticut, you might find that to be a little more expensive possibly with the exception of that, you know, larger legal notice that you talked about.

SENATOR MCLACHLAN: Thank you. Thank you, Mr. Killian. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

KENDALL WIGGIN: Good afternoon, Senator Musto and members of the GAE Committee. My name is Kendall Wiggin and I am the State Librarian. I want to thank the Committee for raising S.B. 1057 and I'm here to speak in favor of it. I have submitted written testimony, so I'm only

library to ensure that the records of state government, the ones that create today are maintained to meet the needs of the state and its citizens now and in the future.

The state library is under-resourced to successfully provide the same level of confidence in the preservation, management, and ongoing access to electronic records you have come to expect from us with paper records. Our town clerks are also physically challenged to deal with the ever-growing move to electronic records at the municipal level. I spelled out for the Committee the estimated revenue on how the funds might be used in my testimony.


Section 3 extends the authority of the state -- the state library has for the preservation standards for paper records to electronic records. Sections 4 through 6 deal with the essential nature of government records including electronic records and their inclusion in disaster and emergency response plans. We've found through all of the various disasters both in Connecticut and in the nation that many times municipal records and state records have been subject to harm because of those adverse conditions. And yet many at the state or municipal -- we don't take the idea that we need to know what records are essential to bring government back into functioning capacity. So that's something that we're asking for in this bill as well.

I'd like to thank you for the opportunity to testify before you today, and I urge the Committee to pass this bill. Also for the record although I did not submit testimony, I am in support of S.B. 111. And we submitted some testimony to try to provide a little clarity in your deliberations of S.B. 762. At that, I'd be



- 1) Set goals and state expected outcomes, such as "Strive for achieving a position of national leadership through development of innovative strategies and programs".
- 2) Call for the establishment of three distinct centralized web portals, Municipal, Education, and Business/eCommerce, to better focus on and serve those market segments.
- 3) Call for development of a quasi-public agency, similar to the lottery commission, in order to monetize the web.

My name is Jennifer Herz and I am Assistant Counsel for the Connecticut Business & Industry Association (CBIA). CBIA represents approximately 10,000 businesses throughout Connecticut and the vast majority of these are small companies employing less than 50 people.

CBIA supports SB 111 An Act Implementing the Recommendations of the Program Review and Investigations Committee Concerning the Creation of Governance Structure to Implement E-Government.

CBIA understands the importance of creating a strong e-government system and supports the efforts of the Program Review and Investigations (PRI) Committee. To that end, CBIA supports SB 111, which implements a central tenant of the PRI Committee recommendations by establishing an e-government board.

As stated in the PRI Committee report (Assessment of Connecticut's Implementation of E-Government, dated December 2010) a coordinated collaboration among agencies is key to success. Furthermore, a central body to plan and implement the e-government system is most efficiently achieved with a central governance structure. This group will provide advice, input and direction to support the e-government objectives.

E-Government is important to the Connecticut business community. CBIA supports an environment where government documentation, information and resources are available for review and consumption. An open and accessible government supports compliance and communication. Such an open system also provides an important resource for businesses to better understand the regulatory landscape of their applicable business. ## An Act Implementing the Recommendations of the Program Review And Investigations Committee Concerning the Creation of a Governance Structure to Implement E-Government

The Department of Administrative Services, Bureau of Enterprise Systems & Technologies (DAS-BEST) offers the following testimony regarding Senate Bill 111, An Act Implementing the Recommendations of the Program Review and Investigations Committee Concerning the Creation of a Governance Structure to Implement E-Government.

DAS-BEST is committed to improving Connecticut's E-Government profile through a combination of strategic planning, strategic investment, and coordination among state agencies and offices. The State has undertaken a number of initiatives in recent years that accomplish many of the goals outlined in the bill. For example, in 2012, the legislature authorized a Statewide IT initiatives fund, supported with \$50 million in bond funding, to prioritize IT projects throughout state agencies and offices. This fund is managed by OPM, and projects are approved for funding only after OPM, DAS-BEST, and other stakeholder agencies, if appropriate, have assessed whether the state's investment can be shared between / among other state agencies and offices, and whether the investment meets the state's broad IT policy and operational goals. Work is also underway on an E-Government business portal to expand access to on-line government services and transactions.

While DAS-BEST supports the intent behind Senate Bill 111, we are concerned that the E-Government Board contemplated in this bill is too large and formal to be effective and efficient. The technology field is dynamic, and new opportunities to develop e-business solutions for the wide variety of state government programs, operations and services we provide arise frequently. As a result, the state's e-Government steering committee needs to be nimble and able to evolve with the rapidly changing market and business needs of our clients in order to be effective. DAS-BEST respectfully suggests that an administrative board, rather than one established in statute, is the best way to ensure this work is efficiently and effectively managed.

DAS has been working closely with the Governor's Office, the Secretary of the State, OPM, DECD and other agencies to develop a formal governance structure that will more effectively address not only E-Government activities but broader application of technology across government lines. We would welcome the opportunity to meet with the Committee to discuss these ideas in more detail.

DEPUTY SPEAKER SAYERS:

Representative Mushinsky.

REP. MUSHINSKY (85th):

Thank you, Madam Speaker.

I move acceptance of the Joint Committee's Favorable Report and passage in concurrence with the Senate.

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DEPUTY SPEAKER SAYERS:

The question before the Chamber is on acceptance of the Joint Committee's Favorable Report and passage of the bill.

Representative Mushinsky, you have the Floor.

REP. MUSHINSKY (85th):

Thank you, Madam Speaker.

The Clerk has an amendment, LCO 6724. If the Clerk would please call, and may I be permitted to summarize.

DEPUTY SPEAKER SAYERS:

Will the Clerk please call LCO Number 6724 and --

THE CLERK:

Madam Speaker, LCO Number 6724, Calendar Number 371, House Amendment Schedule designed "A" offered by Representative Mushinsky.

DEPUTY SPEAKER SAYERS:

The Representative asked leave of the Chamber to summarize. Is there any objection to summarization? If not, proceed with summarization.

REP. MUSHINSKY (85th):

Thank you, Madam Speaker.

It's been a while since Program Review completed the study on e-government, and so this amendment

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replaces the bill by updating the language to reflect the progress made in implementing e-government since the original Program Review study in 2010. The amendment replaces the formal e-government board in the file which was opposed by Department of Administrative Services as too unwieldy, and uses two steering groups that have already been established by DAS and also adds the Secretary of State.

The amendment also requires the DAS Commissioner and Office of Policy and Management Secretary to submit a joint report to the Legislature's Appropriations, GAE, and Program Review and Investigation Committees, and specifically identify consumer demand for e-government services based on customer feedback. They must then outline a plan to meet this customer demand.

I move adoption of the amendment.

DEPUTY SPEAKER SAYERS:

The question on -- before the Chamber is on adopt of the amendment. Will you remark further?

Representative Miner of the 66th.

Representative Hwang of the 134th.

REP. HWANG (134th):

Thank you, Madam Speaker.

Some questions to the proponent of this amendment, through you, Madam.

DEPUTY SPEAKER SAYERS:

Please frame your question.

REP. HWANG (134th):

Thank you.

To the esteemed Representative from Wallingford, when you use the word "unwieldy," could you give a little bit of an example as to what were some of the adjustments that were made in this current amendment.

Through you, Madam Speaker.

REP. MUSHINSKY (85th):

Through you, Madam Speaker, when the study was originally written in 2010, there was no steering group in place to coordinate the work of multiple agencies to provide customer services on the web. And so we had recommended a multi-stakeholder process. But since the report was written, the DAS met with us, with our staff, and pointed out they had put in place and restructured an Information and Telecommunications Systems Executive Committee and a second committee to start coordinating this work among agencies, and that if we establish a third group, that would simply delay the work of the -- work in progress.

So we agreed with that recommendation, however, we did, in this amendment, still require a report on identifying customer demand and responding to it because we can't rely strictly on good intentions. So we do want to see the progress made and we do want it submitted to the Committees so we can verify that this consumer demand is being met.

Through you, Madam Speaker -- Mr. Speaker.

(Speaker Godfrey in the Chair.)

DEPUTY SPEAKER GODFREY:

Guess again.

Representative Hwang.

REP. HWANG (134th):

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

And I want to thank the good Representative for her clear answer. Now in regards to this e-government board that's being constituted, is there a chairman that's appointed, is there an individual that is responsible for coordinated efforts? I think in the past statute you actually had the -- the chief information officer for DAS as the -- the chair of that.

Yes, the original panel was larger and, in the opinion of the DAS and OPM, was layering over additional folks on a process that was already underway. So what we did was use their existing

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steering committees that are already at work on coordinating e-government, add four more agency heads appointed jointly by the Commissioner of Administrative Services and the Secretary of OPM. So it will be a smaller group than we originally intended, but it will work more effectively with the steering group in progress.

Through you, Mr. Speaker.

DEPUTY SPEAKER GODFREY:

Representative Hwang.

REP. HWANG (134th):

Thank you.

Through you, Mr. Speaker, I want to thank the good Rep for her answer. As we relate to obviously the purpose of this is savings and using technology to our advantage, is there a fiscal note to this?

Through you, Mr. Speaker.

REP. MUSHINSKY (85th):

Through you, Mr. Speaker, according to the fiscal note there is no fiscal impact.

DEPUTY SPEAKER GODFREY:

Representative Hwang.

REP. HWANG (134th):

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Through you, Mr. Speaker, if -- given that there is no fiscal note, is there even a possibility as I remember reading, that it could actually have significant potential savings to the State?

REP. MUSHINSKY (85th):

Through you, Mr. Speaker, Program Review and Investigations believes that it can, that there will be significant savings. We are recommending cross-collaboration among agencies and identification of common functions between state agencies and municipalities, all of which we believe will save money through e-government services.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker, for me allowing me a hypothetical question. I appreciate that.
