Introduction

One of the earliest recorded actions of the General Court (9 February 1637/38) was the appointment of a Treasurer, Clement Chaplin, to collect the taxes which were imposed at the same meeting to pay the costs of the recent war against the Pequots. Collectors were appointed for each town, to collect taxes, pay bills as authorized and submit accounts to the Treasurer (C.R. I, 12). In April, 1639, Thomas Wells was appointed Treasurer for the next year and an auditing committee, including Mr. Wells, found that "the Country" owed the previous Treasurer about seventeen pounds (C.R. I, 27, 30).

The Fundamental Orders (1639) mentioned the Treasurer in connection with the collection of fines, and they of course included the General Court's authority to make levies on the towns. A separate order of January 14, 1639, described the controls on the Treasurer's disbursements. (C.R. I, 24-26). The code of laws of 1650 contained fairly detailed provisions for the assessment of property and the collection of taxes (C.R. I, 547-551).

As the years went by, the procedures and structure for determining, collecting, expending and accounting for the taxes or "rates" became somewhat more extensive, but the first significant change seems to have been the appointment, in May 1755, of a five-member Committee of the Pay-Table with broad authority to authorize disbursements in connection with defense against the French encroachments and to examine and settle the accounts involved (C.R. X, 365-367). Immediately after the battle of Lexington a very similar Committee of the Pay Table was set up, consisting of William Pitkin, Thomas Seymour, Oliver Ellsworth and Ezekiel Williams (C.R. XIV, 431). The journals and ledgers recording their work began as of 5 May 1775.

In May 1786 the office of Comptroller was established "for the better methodizing and regulating the Public Accounts and for effecting a speedy Settlement of all outstanding Debts due to this State." (S.R. VI, 152-153, 174). James Wadsworth was appointed Comptroller and was reappointed for a second year in May 1787 (S.R. VI, 174, 293). A year later, May 1788, another act was passed "for instituting defining and regulating the Office of Comptroller of the Public Accounts." This act somewhat broadened the duties and authority of the Comptroller, who was now "to superintend all Matters that respect the subject of the Finances of the State." A separate resolution terminated the Committee of the Pay Table and turned its duties over to the Comptroller, to which office Oliver Wolcott Jr. was appointed (S.R. VI, 404-406).

The Comptroller's office has continued to the present with about the same functions. Today it constitutes the State's accounting agency, while the Treasurer is the disbursing and investment agent. Since 1838, when the fifth amendment to the State Constitution took effect, the Comptroller has been an elected official. The current responsibilities of the Comptroller are briefly described in the Register and Manual, 1975, page 85, and the history of the office is outlined in the 1934 edition, pages 74-78.

The records listed below have been transferred to the Library over a period of sixty years. Until recently little was done to identify and describe them. This report must be considered a preliminary one, since a great deal of analysis and rearrangement ought still to be done.

Many additional records of the Comptroller and of the Committee of the Pay Table are in the Connecticut Archives (RG 1), Revolutionary War, Series I and Series II. A descriptive list of these volumes is an appendix to this report. Other closely related materials are among the records of the Treasurer (RG 7) and in other Connecticut Archives Series: Finances, and Finance and Currency. Records of the State Board of Equalization are available in RG 76, Tax Department. U.S. Govt. Tax Lists-CT-1798, 1814, 1816 are at C.H.S.

The first two reports, by James Wadsworth, dated October 1786 and May 1788, are filed separately in the box, together with duplicate pamphlet-bound copies of the reports for 1804 and 1809, and pamphlet-bound copies of reports for 1841, 1842, 1845-1848, 1852 and 1860. The remainder of the reports are arranged chronologically in three bound volumes (1787-1840). The first volume contains also two reports (May 1787 and May 1788) by Oliver Wolcott Jr., at that time a member of the Committee of the Pay Table, on the state of the claims of Connecticut against the United States. (It is probable that these annual reports are the originals which were submitted to the General Assembly, reviewed by auditors and/or a committee, and deposited for safekeeping with the Secretary of the State.) 2. Pay Table "Accounts", 1775-1788

Vouchers, receipts, orders to pay, General Assembly resolutions and other papers related to payments for supplies and services. These papers (and several other series) were received from the Comptroller's Office in 1916 and were partially processed some years ago; folder titles and other captions are often inaccurate. 10. Audited vouchers, 1758-1830.

Orders to pay, notes, certificates, bills of credit and related papers constituting authorization to the Treasurer to make payments out of colony or state funds or evidencing colony or state indebtedness. Many are receipted and many bear notations that they have been audited.

These records, labeled "Treasurer's vouchers", were stored for many years in paper-wrapped bundles marked with the date on which they were audited. Those for the period Oct. 1798-1830 remain in that arrangement. Earlier ones have been unpacked and partially sorted in an effort to make them usable for research. Processing is incomplete and the following list is subject to correction and amplification. Similar orders and vouchers - perhaps duplicates or copies of these - are in Entries 2-5 and succeeding series in this Record Group and in the Connecticut Archives (RG 1).

Abatements, 1758-1798. Selectmen's certifications for abatements of taxes with respect to the indigent. Also records of abatements granted by the General Assembly in response to petitions. **Box 26** also contains excise tax lists, 1789, by town and then by merchant, commodity and amount of excise paid per commodity.
