Introduction

Raymond Earl Baldwin had a distinguished and varied career in Connecticut as lawyer, elected official, political leader and judge. Born in Rye, N.Y. in 1893, he was educated at Middletown High School, Wesleyan University and Yale Law School. After Navy service in World War I, he engaged in law practice in New Haven, Bridgeport and Stratford, serving in the General Assembly in 1931 and 1933. A Republican, he was three times elected Governor, serving 1939-41 and again 1943-46. He was United States Senator from 1946 until he resigned in 1949 to accept appointment to the Connecticut Supreme Court. He became Chief Justice in 1959 and retired in 1963. He was Chairman of the Constitutional Convention in 1965 and more served as a State Referee. Judge Content of the Constitutional Convention in 1965 and more served as a State Referee.
